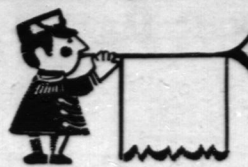


Hagersville Highlights

For three weeks this summer, 32 High School teachers from across Ontario spent their time at the Hamilton Automobile Club participating in the 5th annual Teacher Preparation Course.

R.R. 5, Hagersville, an instructor at Sprucedale School for Boys, was one of them.

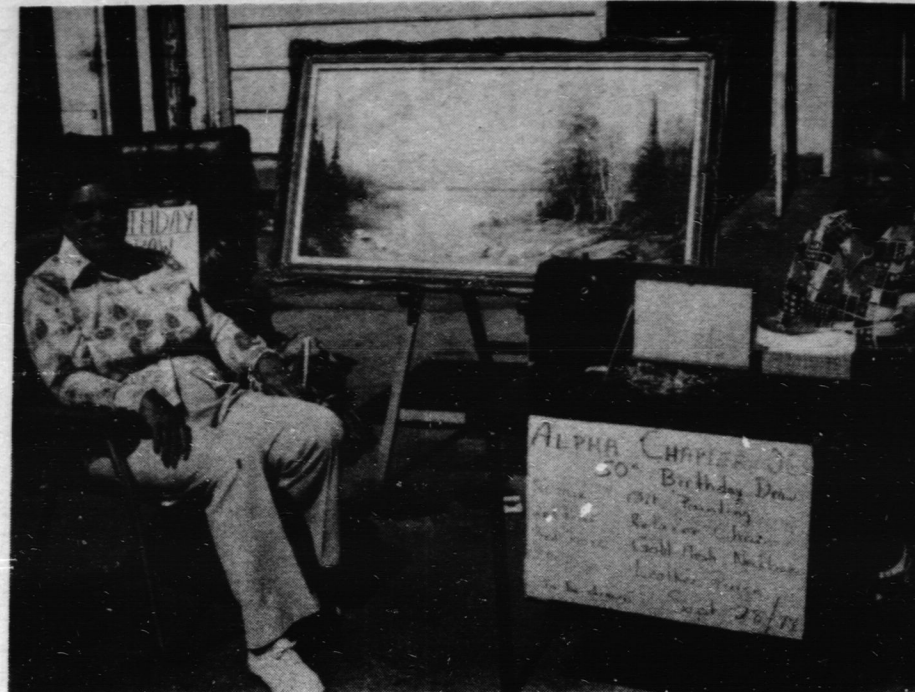
His completion of the course qualifies him to be a lecturer and in-car instructor for High

School Driver Education.

In the course, the many aspects pertaining to Driver Education such as detailed studies on legislation, psychology of driving, mechanical skills and the development of a good attitude towards driving are dealt with.

His classroom sessions included speakers from the Ministry of Transportation and Communication, the Hamilton - Wentworth Regional Police Dept., the Ontario Provincial Police, St. John's Ambulance, Insurance Companies and the Addiction Research Foundation.

The course was sponsored by the Ontario Motor League in cooperation with the Ministry of Transportation and Communications, and particularly financed through bursaries by the Insurance Bureau of Canada and coordinated and directed in Hamilton by the Hamilton Automobile Club.

Layman Speaks In Hagersville

Stanley Jones of Brantford, a well-known and dedicated layman of the United Church of Canada, was the morning speaker at the Hagersville United Church on Sunday morning, September 8. Clerk of Session, Oliver Sayer, also assisted in the service and told the Children's story. Junior member of the congregation, Robbie Malcolm, son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Malcolm, assisted

Mr. Sayer in the story and cooperated to the utmost.

The story, related by Mr. Sayer, showed a sheet of clean white paper. Robbie was asked to put a large black mark in the centre with a magic marker. This mark further left traces on two other sheets of white paper below the original sheet. Mr. Sayer said this reflected the way when a person commits a sin or wrong-doing it leaves a mark, a large mark which cannot be erased; further it affects the lives of their family and loved ones and also leaves traces of the original sin on the friends in the community and area.

Announcements included the forthcoming Triple F Travelling Supper to be held on Saturday evening, September 21st meeting at the Church at 6:30 p.m. and walking to the various homes for the bounteous courses.

Habel Verghese Speaks To Afternoon U.C.W.

Twelve members were present for the afternoon meeting of the Hagersville U.C.W. on Tuesday, September 3 at 2 p.m.

Group leader Mrs. A. Esselment cordially welcomed those in attendance and extended a hearty welcome to our recently acquired Christian Education Director, Mr. Habel Verghese of Hamilton, who kindly accepted the invitation to speak to us for our September meeting.

"Great Gain With Holidays - And Then Return To Work" was chosen as the afternoon topic, with Mrs. Esselment presenting a prayer written by Cardinal Cushing of Boston, pertaining to our present desires and situations. Mrs. Ed James led in reading responsively Psalm 96. Mrs. Esselment read a brief article entitled "Great Gain," which told how Labor Day is celebrated at various times throughout the world, and also of the tragic loss due to accidental death each Labor Day weekend.

Mrs. Pearl Parkinson read the scripture lesson and received the offering.

The leader read 10 Rules for everyday living, entitled "Take Time," followed by a recipe for a Happy Day.

Mrs. Esselment introduced the guest speaker of the afternoon, Mr. Verghese, who said he would not use his topic chosen for the day, but rather "let us all get to know one another much better and keep my topic on the Role of Women for another time."

He told us he was born in Southern India and his father was a minister for half a century in that country. Further, he said the college he attended, "Madras Christian College," was certainly an ecumenical college with Scotch, Irish, English and French professors.

More than 20 years of his life was spent in schools and later several years as a Principal. This was the vocation where he decided his life would be lived only once and he wanted to become a missionary evangelist and travel, see, help and teach.

It was while studying in the U.S.A. in a Christian Education course, that his aim was to continually glorify and praise God. He received his Master of Education degree and travelled to Canada, where he met his wife, who was a teacher at St. Thomas, Ontario. Further plans of Mr. Verghese are many and at present he is President of "Mission to Millions," which is a small group of interested people who aim to start a college in Asia, with complete missionary teachers who will attempt to reach the 450 million Hindus there.

In closing he told of a famous old missionary man in India, who he had met many years ago and continually kept in contact with him during the years since. Mr. Verghese wrote a book on this man, entitled "Missionary Abraham" which he had on display. Mrs. Peggy Hyde graciously thanked the speaker.

President, Mrs. Della Jones presided, and further expressed thanks to the speaker and welcomed each and every-

one to the first meeting of the fall season. Minutes and roll call were presented by Secretary Irene Johnson. The Card and Sick Report prepared by Vera Young was presented by Mrs. Laura Swing presenting the Treasurer's Report.

Discussion included a donation to the Leprosy Fund - carried; the Junior Choir gowns, repair, etc., and the October meeting to be held as usual, with the Roll Call to be answered with an item of non-perishable goods for the new minister's kitchen cupboard.

Lunch was served by the three members on the committee, with the fourth member of the group, Mrs. A. Awde, still confined to West Haldimand Hospital.

On Tuesday, September 3rd, we had our twelfth Jitney of the year. The winners for the games were: Ladies' high - Doris Wilson, second - Mabel Wilson.

Men's high went to Alf Wilson and second, went to Ralph Harrop. Prizes were donated by George Wood this week. I will tell you a little about A Jack Accounted "Dead."

Should the Jack be driven by a bowl in play and come to rest wholly beyond the boundary of the rink, over the bank, or over the side boundary, or into any opening or inequality of any kind in the bank, or rebound to a distance less than 22 yards in direct line from the centre of the front edge of the mat to the Jack in its

rebounded position, it shall be accounted "dead."

"Dead" End - When the Jack is "dead" the end shall be regarded as a "dead" end and shall not be accounted as a played end even though all the bowls in that end have been played. All "dead" ends shall be played anew in the same direction unless both Skips or Opponents in Singles agree to play in the opposite direction.

Playing to a boundary Jack - The Jack, if driven to the side boundary of the rink and not wholly beyond its limits, may be played to on either hand, and, if necessary a bowl may pass on outside the side limits of the rink. A bowl so played, which comes to rest within the boundaries of the rink, shall not be accounted "dead."

A Damaged Jack - In the event of a Jack being damaged, the Umpire shall decide if another Jack is necessary and if so, the end shall be regarded as a "dead" end and another Jack shall be substituted and the end shall be replayed anew.

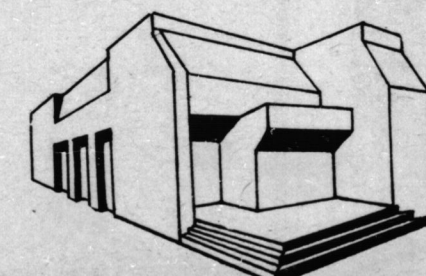
