### DEMOLITION

The tender of Edgil Brothers of \$4,290 for the demolition of a Port Dover service station was accepted by City of Nanticoke council.

### SHORELINE PROPERTY

Keith Layman is the new inspector for the City of Nanticoke under the Shore Line Property Assistance Act.

### AMUSEMENT RIDES

Ross Hoover was recommended by City of Nanticoke Protective Service Committee as inspector of amusement rides and equipment in Port Dover.

### PORT DOVER METERS

City of Nanticoke Protective Services Committee recommended Tuesday Holyoak Security Services be retained on an hourly basis to patrol and maintain parking meters in Port Dover at the hourly rate of \$3.05 plus any basic increase as required by the minimum wage regulations. The total revenue from these meters between June 13 to September 3 was \$2,666.

### PUBLIC WORKS BUDGET

The City of Nanticoke Public Works Committee recommended Tuesday a General Budget amount of \$116,035 plus \$15,000 for drainage studies and \$43,000 for Engineers start-up costs be submitted to the Finance and Administration Committee for inclusion in the Consolidated Budget for 1974.

### Haldimand Advisory Committee

At a meeting in Cayuga Monday night Town of Haldimand approved paying a salary of \$20 per meeting to members of the municipality's Planning Advisory Committee.

### Crossing Guards

Town of Haldimand crossing guards will now be paid \$100 a month, up \$5 from last year.

### General Superintendent

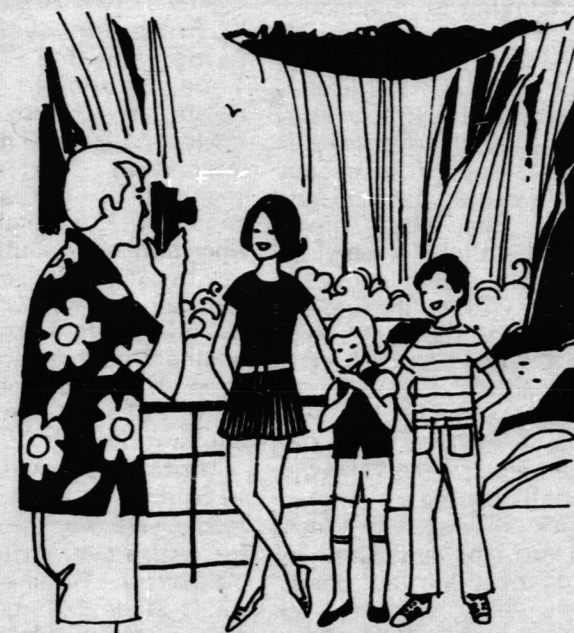
