Theme Mission Impossible

Garnet U.C.W. held its opening meeting of the fall season in the Sunday - school room on September 5.

Water Supply

The fate of future housing development in Jarvis and Hagersville hangs on the two village's need for a greater water supply.

However, the government is not yet prepared to offer any meaningful solutions to the public. Speaking at the annual meeting of the Ontario Municipal Water Association (western division), Everett Biggs, deputy - minister of environment, agreed "to meet the water needs of Port Dover, Stelco, the Lake Erie Industrial Park, Texaco, Jarvis, Hagersville, Caledonia and Cayuga in the Haldimand - Norfolk area, a major regional water supply system will be required."

And he said, depending on results of ground water recharge studies in the Kitchener-Waterloo area, this pipeline could be extended up the Grand River Valley.

He emphasized however, that these thoughts on water supply for Western Ontario were just that and "do not represent by any means commitments on the part of the ministry to implementation."

Wise, Unwise And Otherwise

FUTUROLOGY

Recently a quarterly magazine called "Horizon" printed a number of articles on the future of our civilization. There is a great mass of material but I will try to summarize it. The priests in Babylon (roughly correspondent to our Old Testament) observed the apparent movement of the sun and the moon and conceived the idea of a cosmic cycle -- what has been will eventually revolve into what is now: "There is nothing new under the sun." In India a similar theory was evolved. They conceived that there were four ages through which civilization passed, totalling 4,320,000 years. Incidentally, according to this reckoning, our stage began on the 17th day of February 3,102 B.C.

About 800 B.C. a great prophet arose in Persia named Zoroaster. His view was that the world was in two parts -- that of Light (Ahura Mazda) and that of Darkness (Angra Mainyu). These two forces were in constant warfare and individual persons had free will to join whichever they chose. His social and moral teachings were of a very high standard, requiring charity towards others, kindness to animals and similar things. The Emperor Cyrus, who allowed the Jewish exiles in Babylon to go home, was a follower of Zoroaster's teaching. He predicted a final battle between Light and Darkness in which Darkness will be overthrown and perfect bliss achieved.

We Christians recognize how similar Zoroaster's teaching is to that of Jesus Christ. One difference is that Zoroaster's religion was of human origin whereas Our Lord's had Divine authority. The only followers of the ancient prophet are a small group in India known as Parsees, while the teachings of Jesus are being taught all over the world.
