Cancer drive begins April 1

The Norfolk Unit of the Canadian Cancer Society begins its annual campaign as of April 1. This year the objective is \$22,000.

Research accounts for 58 per cent of the donations, 15 per cent for patient services, 13 per cent for education, six per cent for administration and overhead, five per cent for the campaign, and 3 per cent for the upkeep of lodges for patients.

In 1975 the Norfolk unit attended to 85 patients and supplied and made 10,000 dressings. Workers drove 20,000 miles transporting patients and made 200 trips to cancer clinics.

A total of 600 canvassers will travel throughout the county raising donations.

There will be 50 captains in Simcoe and 350 canvassers. Another 250 canvassers will operate throughout the rest of the county.

This year's publicity chairwoman is Mrs. Betty Pearson, 19 Lyndale Rd., Simcoe.

Area captains are Mr. Harry Cox, Simcoe; Mrs. M. Watters, Delhi; Mrs. Preston, Jarvis; Miss E. Waugh, Waterloo; Mrs. G. Pearson, Port Rowan; Mrs. M. Hitchon, Port Dover; and Mrs. VanHooren, Langton.

Asks for study

Ontario Environment Minister William G. Newman asked the Waste Management Advisory Board at its inaugural meeting in Toronto today for a full examination of the use of non-returnable liquor and wine bottles.

"I would like you to research fully the area of liquor and wine bottles with the objective of reducing this component of solid waste generated by consumers," he told the board.

He said the board's recommendations would assist the Ontario Government in its attempt to deal with this matter.

Mr. Newman also called upon the board to monitor the soft drink industry to keep it to the deadlines he imposed for the reintroduction of returnable and refillable containers.

The Environment Minister met with representatives of Ontario's soft drink industry earlier this month and told them he wanted an early return of reusable containers for consumer use. He informed the industry that unless it voluntarily met the deadlines, it would face legislative action.

The 11-member board chaired by Mr. R.H. Woolvett and recently appointed by the Minister will be responsible for assisting in further developing the province's program of resource recovery.
