### O.B.A. elects new executive

At the Ontario Baseball Convention, held in Sarnia, an entirely new executive was elected. Jim Lutton of Oshawa will be the new president with Jack Lee of Thorold being first vice president. Keith Weese of Corunna was elected 2nd vice with Grant Wade getting the nod for third vice. Wade beat out Southern Counties Bill Hulme and Earl Chandler for the position. Spud

Chandler, as he is known in our league, is Southern Counties president. The other members of the executive were Carmen Bush of Toronto, Jim Frail of Hamilton, Ange Pastore of St. Catharines, and Ron Pegg of Flesherton.

One of the main changes in the constitution for the coming year will be that players will be allowed to use metal bats. Fastball has used them for two years but this will be the first season for baseball to use them. They cost anywhere from 10 to 30 dollars but a team should not use any more than three or four bats in a year, whereas before you could break that many in one practice.

Players must also use or wear a protective helmet that has a side piece covering the ear facing the pitcher. This is mandatory for teams in the S.C.B.A. and in O.B.A. playoffs.

The O.B.A. had 661 teams registered last season with 10,414 players. It was agreed to hold registration fees for teams at the same level as last year with the hopes of getting more teams involved. The new president, in his address asked that coaches and parents work at getting the younger teams started, stating that if you do not have the young teams you have nothing to feed the older teams in later years.
