Sales Tax Rebate

New Automobiles **Expires Soon**

Arthur Meen, Minister of Revenue, in a letter to members of the legislature December 4 reminded them that the program for rebating retail sales tax on new cars is winding down and will expire December 31, 1975, as originally announced.

Mr. Meen reviewed the criteria for receiving the rebate: "In order to qualify for the rebate, a new automobile must be registered in the purchaser's name on or before December 31, 1975. No tax rebate will be made for vehicles registered after

"New car buyers should be aware that qualification is determined by the registration date, not the date of delivery," he added. "Therefore, cars that are purchased and registered by December 31 but delivered after the new year, will qualify for the rebate."


