Bus operating costs have escalated rapidly during the past few months according to the Haldimand Board of Education. And trustees have decided to break a contract signed in June of 1974 and give operators an increase of \$600 per bus for the remainder of the contract. The agreement, which became effective September 1st, will

terminate in June. Trustee Don Chamber protested against the move, saying it was a valid contract which should not be broken.

He pointed out the Board's new transportation formula represents a 12.6 per cent increase. The contract agreed upon last spring provided for an 11.5 -18.6 per cent increase. Mr. Chambers felt the total


