

Terriers Grab First Win Of Playoffs 6-3

The Dunnville Terriers grabbed the first win of the semi-final playoff series with a 6-3 win over the Hagersville Flyers. The Flyers ended up in third place and the Terriers were in first and as a result the two teams meet in a best of seven series with the winner playing Simcoe or Merritton.

Hagersville scored first when Tony Yacobino finished off a three way passing play with Glen Hewson and Paul Fryett. It took Dunnville only two minutes to pull even as Wayne Vallee scored. The Flyers were 2 men short at the time and the Terriers one. Dave Farr and Mike Hedden got the puck to Vallee for his second of the night and the first of the second period to take the lead for good.

Andy Couvillion made it 3-1 as Doug Siddall and Paul Sorge picked up assists. The Flyers narrowed the gap when Yacobino was awarded a penalty shot. The

shot was awarded when a Terrier fell on the puck in the crease. Tony made no mistake as he walked in and drew Mike Robinson out of the net before tucking the puck in.

The Hagersville Flyers and themselves in trouble after dropping the first 2 games of the semi-final series to Dunnville by a score of 5-4. The Dunnville Terriers finished in first place and in 6 meetings with the Flyers they lost only once. The writing is on the wall and the Flyers will have to come up with some good hockey if they expect to win a game in this series. They played a lot better in

this game than in the first game of the series outshooting the Terriers 48-40 but still are unable to put the puck in the net.

The referee must have heard there was some feelings running high in this series and decided to clamp down right from the start. He handed out 10 penalties to Hagersville in the first period including a 10-minute misconduct while Dunnville sat out six with one a 10-minute for fighting
