In some cases he feels that mineral deficiencies could also occur. Some rations may require double the normal amount of mineral. But before making drastic changes perhaps a feed analysis may be advised.

## Federation News

There must be a new study undertaken to determine the route of the new expressway from Hamilton to Nanticoke. As the present study team completed their second round of public meetings, it has become increasingly clear, that the meetings have not been used for public participation, but to sell their own ideas to the public. The Haldimand Federation has taken a

special interest in the planning of this route as it is farmers' land that will be needed, and therefore farmers will be affected by its location more than anyone else. At a special meeting with the student team by the Federation, they took the same position as at public meetings, and were only prepared to defend their own ideas, and not prepared to accept new ones.

The planning of new highway must take into consideration some very basic principles. 1. It must be a direct route as possible. 2. It must avoid as much good farm land as possible. 3. It must avoid severing farm as much as possible. 4. It must angle across farm land as little as possible. When the location of a highway takes part of a farm, it is not only the residence, but the whole farm enterprise that is affected and therefore, the study team should be looking for farm input and not avoiding it, determining the route

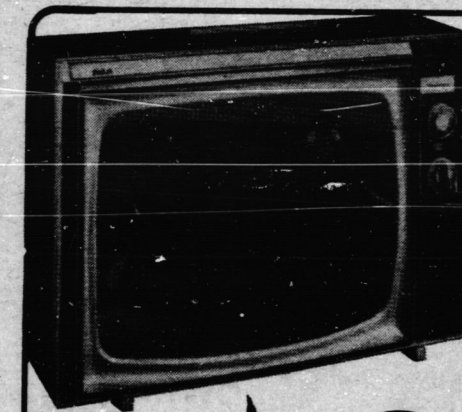
Hagersville

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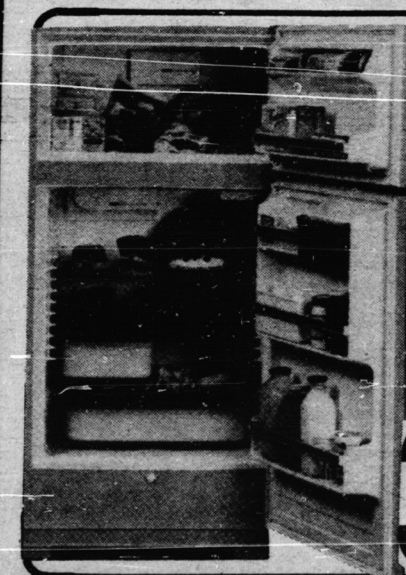
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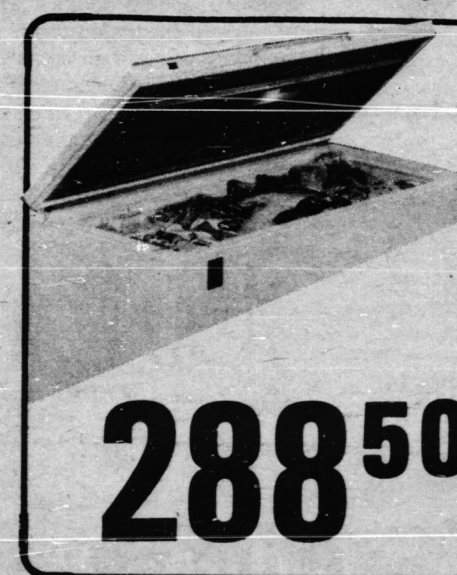
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
