

Terriers maul Flyers four straight games

The Dunnville Terriers maul the Hagersville Flyers in four straight games as they advanced into the finals against Simcoe in a series that starts this week. After dropping the first two games of the series the Flyers bounced back to play their best hockey of the season but it was not good enough to pick up a win. The Terriers won the third game 4-3 in a Dunnville game.

Gord Chymko and Doug Siddall scored first period

goals for the Terriers and these two goals were too much for the Flyers to overcome. Bill Winkworth scored an unassisted second period goal to make the score 2-1 but Paul Sorge upped the score to 3-1 early in the third period. Bob Fowless took a pass from Sandy Gibbons and Greg Ross to close the gap at 3-2.

At the five minute mark of the last period Dean Webb finally put the Flyers on the scoreboard and this gave them added life. The Flyers put on tremendous pressure and were rewarded with a second goal from the stick of Paul Fryett.

The Flyers, fighting to the last whistle, kept pouring on the pressure and came within one point of tying the game up as Hewson's shot rang off the post. Dunnville picked up the rebound and raced down the ice to score the 4th goal and put the game out of reach for the Flyers.

There was a good crowd on hand for the final game of the year and the Flyers received good support all season. This was a good league for its first year of operation and like all new things there were a few minor problems.
