Campbell to speak in Jarvis

Margaret Campbell, Toronto, Liberal Member of the Ontario Legislature for Toronto's St. George Riding, will be the feature speaker at the annual meeting of the Haldimand-Norfolk Liberal Association at Jarvis on Saturday, March 8th.

A member of the Legal Profession, Mrs. Campbell is a graduate of the University of Toronto and Osgoode Hall, and prior to entering provincial politics served at the municipal level in Toronto, having been elected first — as an Alderman and as such, serving as "Budget Chief". She was later elected to the Board of Control. Following her tenure in municipal government she

was appointed as a Judge of the Family Court in Toronto, a position which she held prior to being elected to the Ontario House in March of 1973 when she won a by-election in her "Queen City" riding. Margaret Campbell now serves as the Liberal critic in the Legislature on topics of Health, Housing and Welfare.

With a speaker of such calibre, the meeting of March 8th promises to be an inspiring one for the local riding Liberals and those who are interested in attending are advised to secure their tickets early. The meeting will take place at the Explorer Inn at 6:30 p.m.

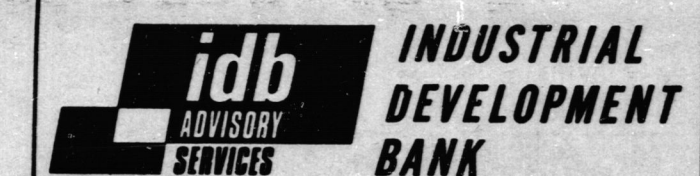
