The president and first vice-president were named delegates to the annual meeting of Ontario Soil and Crop Improvement Association to be held at Ottawa January 21-23.

Grant Richardson, Dunnville is director of the Ontario Association representing Haldimand, Norfolk and Brant.

Cost Study information from eight Haldimand corn growers show that an average cost of corn production in 1974 was \$91.50 per acre.
