## O.P.P. Report

Five stolen vehicles, two from Hamilton, two from Brantford and one from Welland, were recovered during the past week in the Town of Haldimand.

## Meats With Approval

The difference between meat inspection and meat grading is often perplexing to consumers. While grading is done only to inspected meat, the fact that not all inspected meat is graded adds greatly to the confusion.

Inspection and approval of the meat begins while the animal is alive, continues through the packing process and concludes only when the meat leaves the packing plant, according to Dr. G.C. Fleming, a veterinarian with the Veterinary Services branch of the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food.

The Ministry licenses 255 meat packing plants in Ontario, many of them small compared to the large well-known plants. The

## You And Your Post Office

Postmaster General Bryce Mackasey has announced the issue of three additional Olympic Action stamps, the second set of surcharged stamps to be issued by the Canada Post Office.

These Olympic Action Stamps, designed by Wallis & Matanovic of Toronto, will be issued February 5, 1975, and feature the water sports of swimming, rowing and sailing.

They will be printed by the Canadian Bank Note Company Limited of Ottawa.

These stamps will be available February 5.



## H-N Encourages Greater Use Of Returnable Jars

Haldimand-Norfolk councillors would like to see Queen's Park encourage greater use of returnable glass containers throughout the province.

At a meeting in Cayuga last Thursday, members endorsed a resolution from the Township of March on returnable containers, with the exception of one clause.

It suggested the province should declare its intention to ban, under the Environmental Protection Act of 1971, non-refillable glass and metal packaging for all commodities which

can be safely marketed in refillables.

Although the resolution stipulated manufacturers, retailers and the public should be given adequate time to prepare for the change, H-N objected to the far-reaching implications the word "all" would have.

Councillor John Roxburgh of Nanticoke, owner of several grocery stores, expressed fear of the costs the consumer would have to bear for retooling of numerous containers. He pointed out that in his store alone 490 companies, with hundreds of varying products, would be affected

by the demand for change. The resolution would not only cover beer and pop bottles, but jam jars, coffee jars and others, he said.

Councillors did agree, however, that the anticipated conversion to the metric system could be utilized for the simultaneous standardizing and reducing in number of sizes for glass containers.

The Township of March resolution said studies show that a system of recycling glass containers into new containers consumes over three times as much energy as a reusable system. And it indicated the re-use of glass containers reduces post consumer waste, mining waste and consumption of virgin raw materials.
