

More Than One College In The Area

(continued from page 1) has authorized Mohawk College to proceed with the planning of a new campus in H.N. in cooperation with McMaster University and the Ministry of Treasury, Economics and Intergovernmental Affairs.

In their plans for educational development in the area, to be affected by the Nanticoke industrial development, Mohawk and McMaster have already established an Educational Information Centre in Hagersville and part-time courses are being offered there. The two institutions have also established an advisory committee of people from the area to advise in the planning of post-secondary education.

Catherine Smale, mover of the resolution, made reference to a meeting in Simcoe last week regarding the future of Fanshawe. She told councillors she understood the Council of

Regent's decision was made without consultation with Fanshawe.

Councillors are also requesting "this unilateral decision (re: Mohawk) be set aside and that no decision be made on this important matter until such time as full conversation can be arranged with the three community colleges presently functioning in this region."

Mrs. Smale said Dr. J.A. Colvin, president of Fanshawe, has not been officially notified what or whether there will be a role of Fanshawe here. Fanshawe presently offers

Haldimand Mayor David Pearson said he would support the motion at this time, but feels in the future there should be one college under one jurisdiction.

In their authorization to Mohawk College to proceed with planning in cooperation with the university, the council has advised the adjacent Fanshawe College in London and Niagara in Welland that they may make representation regarding their interests in the area within the next 60

days, a news release to the Record explained.

The Council of Regents also stated the Haldimand-Norfolk Region may eventually be the centre for a new college in which the planned new campus would be incorporated.

Norman Sisco, chairman of the Ontario Council of Regents said Monday the recent decision to allow Mohawk to plan a new Haldimand-Norfolk campus doesn't mean that Fanshawe College or Niagara College will have to move out.

excluded because it would attract the least amount of traffic, Mr. Radbone said. It is also too far east for the utilities, would cut diagonally across farm boundaries and would have a negative impact on the Town of Stoney Creek.

Residents who attended the last series of public meetings were also given an opportunity to state their priorities in route selection. They were as follows: disruption of farm economy, noise pollution, community disruption, natural environment, cost, property severances, economical development and loss to business on Highway 6. The project team added three more areas for consideration — flexibility for construction staging, suitability for utilities and aesthetics.

With the elimination of the Highway 56 Route, the choice south of Caledonia to Nanticoke is narrowed down to the East Route and Central Route since Glanville, West, Central and CNR Routes all become one below the town.

In a route evaluation, the East Route scores lower than the other alternatives, Otto Maier of the Ministry of Transportation and Communication told councillors. He admitted it is suitable for the utilities, but not for traffic service. The East Route cuts diagonally across lot lines in four areas, resulting in a high degree of property severances. Mr. Maier

pointed out it would affect more woodlots and streams, as well as more homes with noise pollution. It is also dependent on an expressway network in Hamilton.

South of Caledonia the West Route, Glanville Route, Central Route and CNR Route all follow together the Hydro right-of-way and Regional Road 3 for about two-thirds of their length.

North of Caledonia, Mr. Maier said the West and Glanville Routes score better. The West Route branches off towards Highway 403, providing service to the Hamilton Airport and passing close to residential areas in Ancaster. The Glanville Route runs through agricultural land, near residential development along Glanville Road and then joins Highway 403 at Mohawk Road.

The Central and CNR Routes assume the existence of the Mountain Freeway — Red Hill Link or a similar system.

Mr. Maier said the Central Route will have to be adjusted around the CNR land assembly at Garnet in order not to cut through the centre of the railway's development.
