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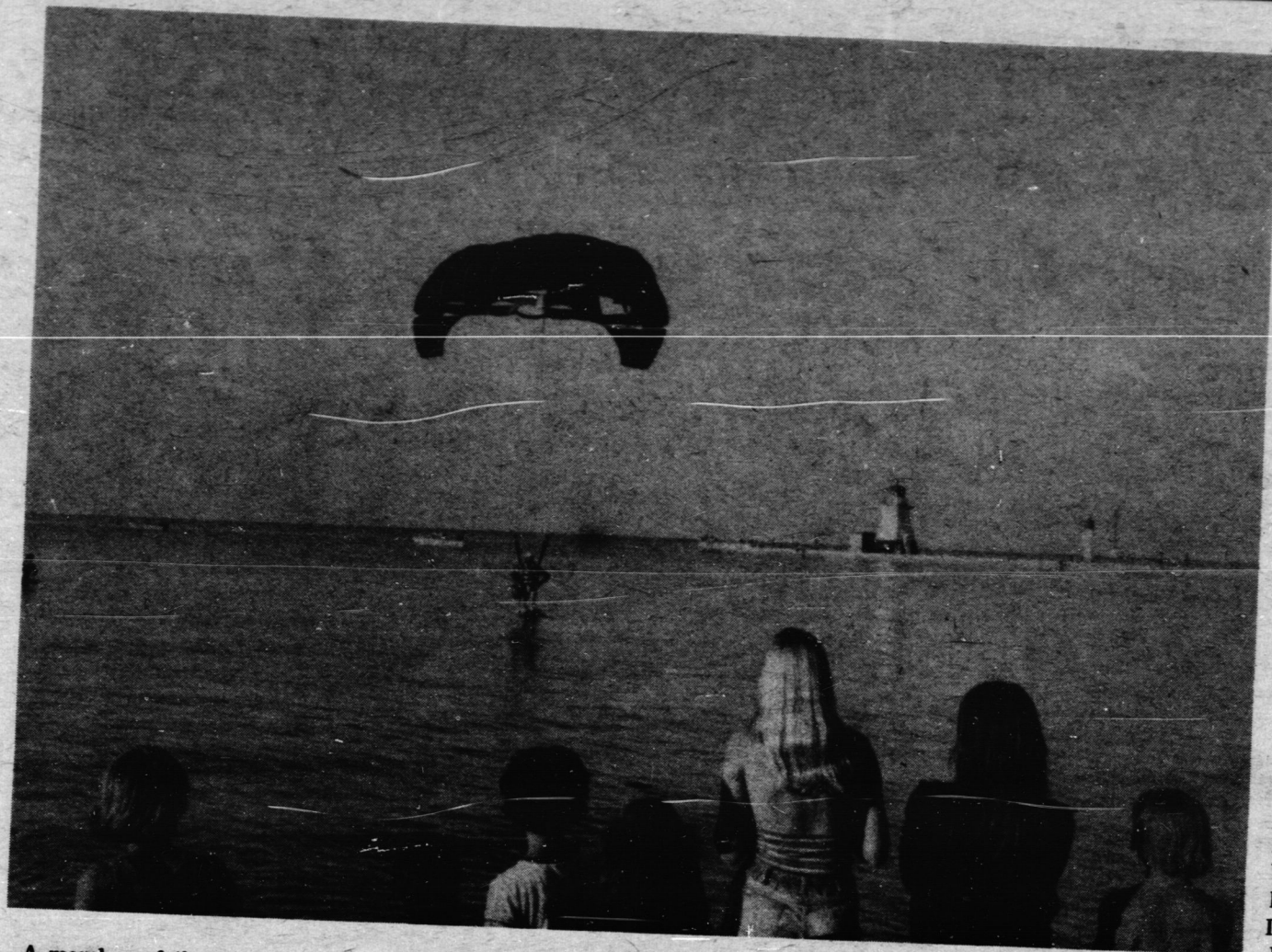

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Jarvis residents may face water rationing

Residents of Jarvis who found themselves without water for a few hours last Tuesday, need not be surprised when it happens again, according to reports from the Region of Haldimand-Norfolk Engineering Department.

Jarvis residents ran out of water at 11:45 a.m. on Tuesday and it was restored by 12:45 p.m. According to Ronald Barry, Regional Water Superintendent, the problem is that the old line which brings the water up from the lake is not strong enough to carry more water up the rise.

"There is 119 feet of grade between the lake and the pumping station," said Mr.

Barry, "and I'm not sure if more pumps were put on at the lake, if the pipeline would stand it."

The old water line was originally put in by the government in 1939 to service the army barracks east of Jarvis.

Later on the town of Jarvis received the line from the government for the price of

one dollar, under the agreement that the town would supply the army barracks with 40,000 gallons of water per day.

The barracks are now being used as Whiteoaks village, and are still being serviced by the town.

According to Mr. Barry a good rain would help restore the situation to normal as

right now many people are using municipal water to irrigate lawns and gardens.

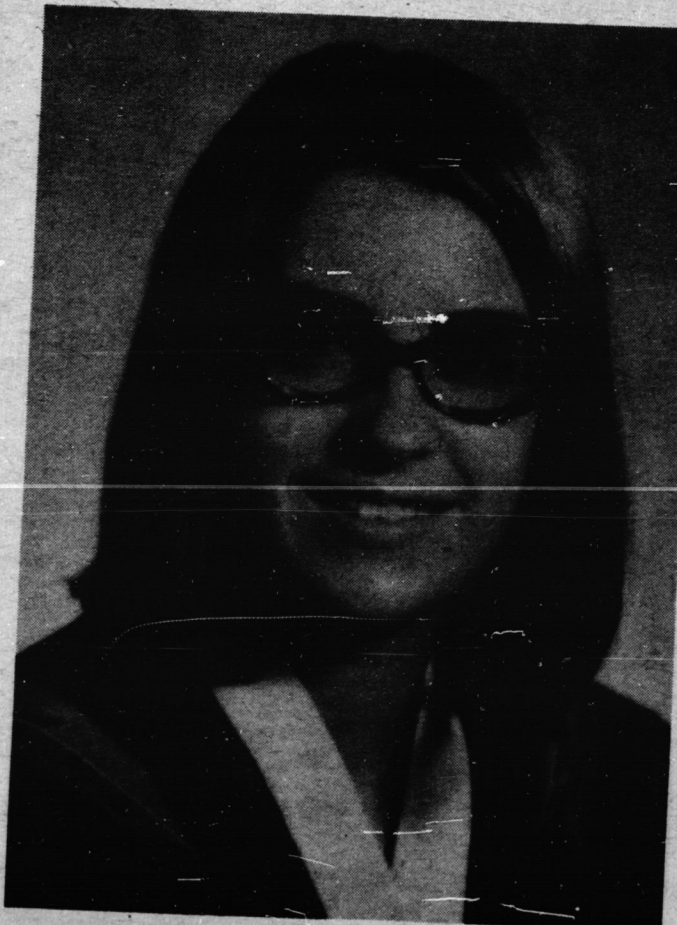
"If we don't get rain in the near future," said Mr. Barry, "we may have to ask people to stop using town water for watering lawns and gardens."

A technical assistant for the Haldimand-Norfolk Region Engineering Department,

Allan Lee, said that the region has no plans for any reconstruction work on the line because the finances don't allow for it.

Also he said the Ontario Ministry of the Environment has committed itself to bringing a new pipeline up through from the lake within five years to service the new Townsend City site as well as Jarvis.

Linda's mailing address--Botswana, Africa

Linda Snyder used to live at R.R. 4 Hagersville, but now it takes her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Snyder, anywhere from one to four months to send a package to their daughter.

Linda works through the CUSO program and right now her mailing address is Thamaga, the republic of Botswana, Africa.

For the past year, Linda has helped the natives of Thamaga to develop their own commercial enterprises. A graduate of the University of Guelph, where she received a degree in domestic sciences, Linda teaches sewing to the native ladies. Many of the clothes they make are sold in various shops in Botswana.

Linda, who is 26, has also worked in Zambia, where she taught home economics in a secondary school. She has

been involved with CUSO since 1971. Linda's two years in Botswana are up in July 1976, but she has told her parents that she may stay on for one more year after that. Dressmaking is not the only commercial enterprise in

Thamaga. The women have also been taught how to make pottery, and the proceeds from the sales of both these products allow the natives of Thamaga to help support themselves.

Botswana is located between Rhodesia and South Africa. The republic covers an area of 220,000 square miles, and has a population of 650,000, three people to every square mile.

Every year, about 18 inches of rain fall, although only every 10 years there are three or four years of drought.

This year, the rainy season was so heavy, that the pottery workshop in Thamaga

where Linda and the native women work, collapsed. not only that, their only transportation, a friends truck, has been redeemed by its owner, and the people of Thamaga, including Linda

are without transportation. Although a bus is available, it is impossible for them to take the pottery and clothing they hope to sell into Botswana without a truck.

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
