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Ruttman wins race eight

The roll call "What is Your Personal Hobby" was well responded to. Mrs. Hubert Field was program convenor. Mrs. Clifton McLean gave the motto "Just because there is snow on the roof doesn't mean the fire is out." The topic was a talk from a member of a Senior Citizen group. This was very well given by Mrs. Earl Sider, who is a member of the Selkirk Senior Citizens group.

The theme for the program was hobbies for retirement. Mrs. Hubert Field read an article on "No man is really happy or safe without a hobby." A contest conducted by Mrs. Hubert Field was won by Mrs. Clifton McLean. Everyone present was asked for a current event. Several members had brought their hobbies for display.

The president closed the meeting with all singing the Women's Institute Grace and God Save the Queen. A delicious picnic supper on the grounds of the museum was very much enjoyed.

Joe Ruttman, of Westland, Michigan, won the 100 lap Carling O'Keefe event easily pacing the charging Norm Lelliott, never letting him closer than a couple of car lengths at any time during the race. Although Lelliott set fast time of 20.02 seconds, Ruttman was only 8/100's slower at 20.104 seconds for a circuit of the 1/2 mile London oval.

On the first lap, Ruttman charged from his outside pole starting position to take the lead going into the first corner. He led all the way to pick up the checkered. Second place was nailed down by Norm Lelliott, the Carling O'Keefe racing team driver who was never seriously challenged for second, as Ed. Howe, of Beaverton, Michigan also was alone in third spot. The tightest battle of the event was for the next three positions, with Jerry Makara Junior Hanley, and Howie Scannell fending one another off for the first half of the race, until about the half-way

mark. Howie Scannell slipped a position, then a lap later slipped another and then the battle continued between Jerry Makara and Junior Hanley for the rest of the race. Hanley tried constantly to pass the speeding Makara but each time was foiled and eventually had to settle for fifth place when the checker fell. His last lap charge for the fourth place position had the crowd on their feet as the two drivers dived for the checkered flag.

Before the race, in pre-race inspection, the NASCAR Canada officials discovered an illegal hidden electric fuel pump on the AVC-built Camaro of Joe Ruttman. Since there were three other AVC-built cars entered in the race, they also were checked and two of them also were found to have the hidden pump. They were allowed to race after the offending device was disconnected.

Although Norm Lelliott was scheduled to drive a new car, his plans were altered drastically when he broke an

engine during a practice session, Friday afternoon. He drove his original car that he took with him when he joined the Carling team last year.

Ed Howe drove his car for the first time after completely wrecking it on Wednesday night at a track in Michigan. He took it home, put a new front end and a new rear end on the car. In fact, he stated before the race that about the only original parts left on the car were the safety cage that surrounds the driver.

For Farmers Only

Barley grown on irrigated Alberta land that is expected to produce 120 bushels per acre and a 120,000 acre parcel of leased land that is expected to pasture 500 beef cattle were just two of the extremes observed by participants in the recent Haldimand Soil and Crop Improvement Association tour of Alberta. The warm reception at all of the farms and ranches visited was also one of the extremes.

Highlights of the tour included an impromptu branding demonstration, the private confession of one farmer to having borrowed a million dollars from the bank, a special ranch cooked beef dinner, meeting a

farmer who is also a director of a national railway and a conducted tour of the St. Mary's River Irrigation District.

A bus ride for over three miles across a 17,000 acre ranch also has to be included among the highlights. If one considers that travel is to see what competitors are doing the production potential of

the irrigated areas is most impressive. While there are different systems used the one gaining in popularity seemed to be a pivot system that would irrigate 130 of each 160 acres.

The Alberta guide for the tour was himself a feature of the trip in that he is the author of several books, a former editor of Country Guide and most knowledgeable concerning the area and people visited.

All 38 of the participants in Soil and Crop Tour also enjoyed a day at the Calgary Stampede and many bits of sightseeing along the way.

It is expected that many others will be able to share in the experience through the many slides and pictures that the tour group will assemble.

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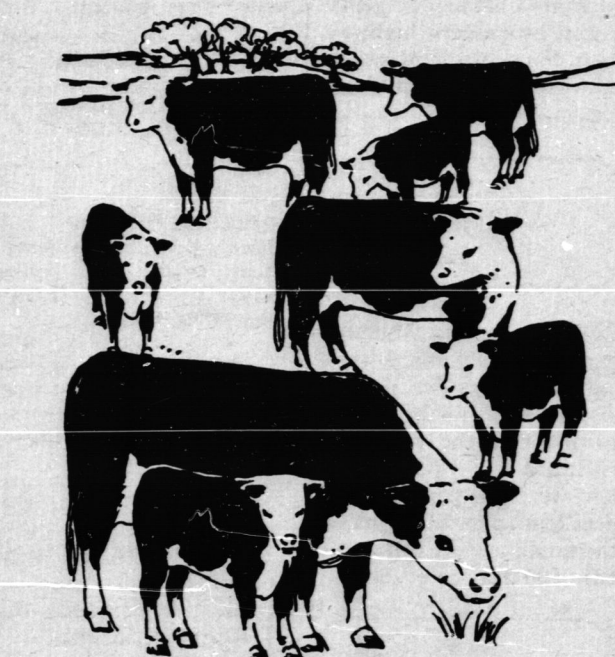
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For 1975, your fee will be \$5 per cow, however, for this year fees are deferred until payments to producers are made. The provincial government contracts to make a grant per cow to participating producers if the average market price for Ontario-produced stocker calves falls below the stabilized price of 50¢ per pound in 1975.

Payments will be made in December or as soon as possible thereafter.

The enrollment period for eligible producers in 1975 ends August 31.
