## Wise, unwise and otherwise

### ORIGINAL LANGUAGES

Today everyone knows that the Bible (including the beloved Authorized Version) is not an original in English but a translation. It might be interesting to take a look behind the English translation to try and find out the original languages in which the various books were written.

The New Testament is easy. It was all written in Greek, the universal language of the day.

The Old Testament is different, its writings cover a period of about 1,000 years in how many languages does that one language remain? Moses was brought up in the

Egyptian Court, he must have spoken the Egyptian language. This brings up a question--was the Pentateuch written originally in Egyptian? No scholar suggests such a thing but it could have happened.

It seems more likely, however that the Hebrews had their own sacred writings and a strong oral tradition from which the Pentateuch originated. How they preserved them in the face of Egyptian oppression were not told. The Hebrew language was a part of the Semitic group of languages (Assyrian, Babylonian) and that was written on clay tablets about the size of your hand.

All this is rather idle speculation, but it does give us a little insight into the long history of the Old Testament whose writings cover a period of over 5,000 years. To me, at any rate, it is a miracle that these writings should have come down so many centuries when all the other writings of the same periods have perished. It is truly "The Book with which God always had His way."

## THE MILK COMMISSION OF ONTARIO

## Fluid Milk Inquiry

The Milk Commission of Ontario by authority vested in it under The Milk Act will undertake an Inquiry into certain aspects of the Milk Industry.

The Inquiry will attempt to determine how, after delivery to the processor, certain elements in the milk distribution chain contribute to the final price paid for fluid milk.

The nature of the Inquiry will include the acceptance of written Briefs and the receipt of Submissions, as well as a series of public meetings throughout the Province.

Persons or groups wishing to make representation to the Commission on any aspect of the Inquiry are requested to write to the Secretary of the Milk Commission of Ontario or to submit written Briefs with the undersigned not later than June 21st, 1975.

Public Hearings will be held at times and places in Ontario to be announced later and those filing Briefs or letters who wish to appear personally will be advised as to the time and place when they will be heard.

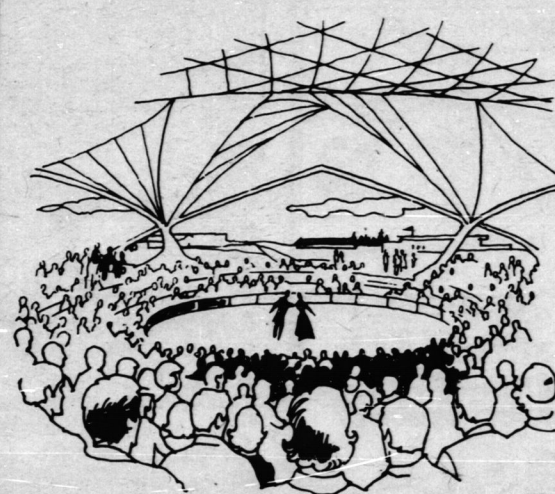
