This is because true air speed is calculated by the speed of the vehicle in relation to the wind. Because the balloon moves with the same velocity as the wind then its true air speed is zero.

When asked if he thought ballooning is dangerous, and why he does it, Mr. Sparks replied, "If I thought I was going to get hurt doing this type of thing, I wouldn't do it. I do it because it is there and because I am having fun."

However even though Bob Sparks chooses to ignore the danger there is, it nevertheless remains. In 1973 he made a trans-Atlantic attempt that lasted 23 hours and 50 minutes. Seven hours and ten minutes of that trip were spent in a severe thunderstorm off the coast of Cape Breton Island.

He was flying in a helium balloon and was riding in a 14 and one half foot by seven and a half foot sea sled which is self-righting and self-bailing. He will be riding in a similar boat during an attempt to be made in July this year.

During the storm, lightning struck his craft many times, although he wasn't hurt because it wasn't grounded. Wind speeds and consequently, the speed of his own

craft, reached as high as 125 m.p.h. and his altitude varied from 1400 feet to 15,000 feet at the whims of up and down draughts.

"I was really shook up. You can't imagine the fury and force of being inside a storm like that and having to ride it out until it dies," he said.

It was so dark he couldn't even see the surface of the water, and the temperature was a constant 32 degrees while the balloonist was soaked to the skin.

Prior to 1972 the world record for the longest duration flight was eight hours and 48 minutes. In December of that year he substantially broke this record when he drifted from LaFayette, Indiana to Ashmore, Illinois, a journey of over 100 miles in 11 hours and 48 minutes.

The team is currently engaged in a national tour which began in the U.S. on Feb. 15. Then moved north to fly across the Great Lakes.

"With the exception of Lake Michigan, not one other Great Lake has been crossed previously by a balloonist," said public relations man Lewis Hodges.

Mr. Sparks kicked off the lake flights by flying over Lake Superior on May 3 from Silver Bay, Minn. to Upson, Wisconsin, a 77 mile journey.

The last great lake left for him now is Lake Ontario. But, what it all is leading up to is another crack at the Atlantic flight, which Bob

Sparks hopes to begin sometime in July.

"I'll consider anywhere between Finland, and Italy a pin-point landing," he said.




