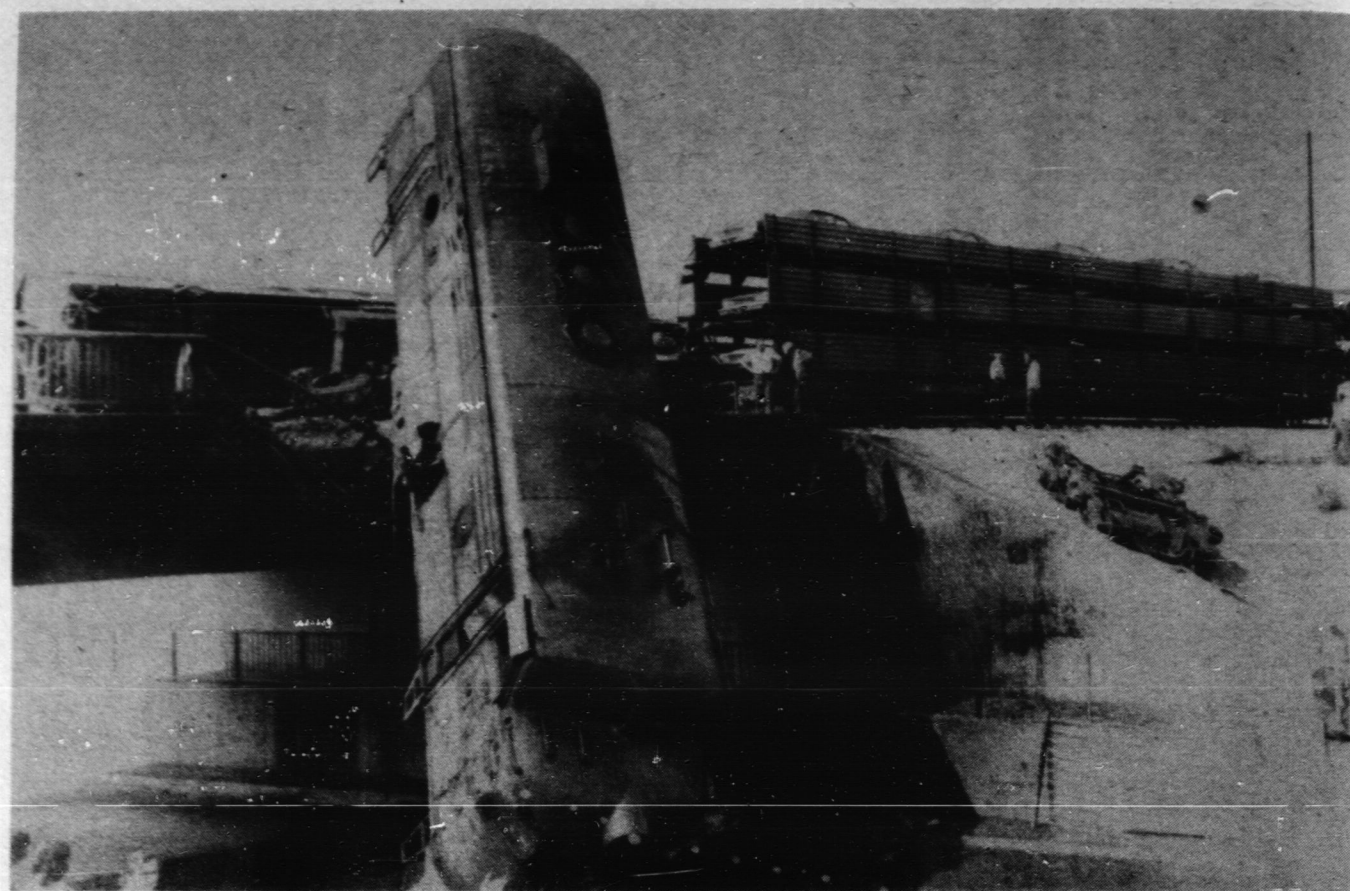
First Vice President Don Mitchell reported on the Indochina School for incoming officers, held in Merriton.

The City of Nanticoke Public Library Board met in the Selkirk Library, June 9 at 1 o'clock, with Gordon Laidlaw presiding. Present were Margaret Payne secretary, Dan O'Dwyer, Dorothy Doughty, Frances Bergen, Norma Savory, Paul Zaluski, Joyce Lindsay, representing the Niagara Regional Library System Board, and the librarians, Glen Bell, Waterford, Norma Cosley, Port Dover and Teddy Abbott, Selkirk. The Treasurer's report was presented by Joyce Lindsay in the absence of Graydon Field. The accounts from each library were studied. It was moved

by Margaret Payne seconded by Paul Zaluski that these be paid.

After some discussion, it was moved by Norma Savory, seconded by Frances Bergen, that there be no meetings during July and August, barring an emergency. That Graydon Field be authorized to pay the bills when summarized and presented in the usual way.

Joyce Lindsay gave an account of a Library Regional board meeting she had attended, also spoke of the trustee's workshop she and Graydon Field had been to in St. Catharines. The librarians

gave their reports. The plants around the Port Dover library were bought and placed by the Historical Society, as a "thank you" for the use of the building for meetings. Waterford has an Opportunity for Youth group working there. Selkirk has two bus loads of local people going to the Shaw Festival Theatre June 12. All libraries are functioning well, and without any significant problem. Much of this is due to the fine co-operation within the board, and between the board and librarians. The next meeting will be September 8, in the Port Dover Library.

## Bass season opens

Bass season officially opens June 28 for both smallmouth and largemouth bass. The Ministry of Natural Resources anticipates that bass fishing in Long Point Bay will be good this summer due to a strong year class from 1971 which are now four-year olds. The water level of Lake Erie is down somewhat from last year, but not enough to hinder the habitat of the fish. The daily catch of both largemouth and smallmouth bass or any combination thereof is six per person. Possession limit shall not exceed one

day's legal limit. Some anglers like to get a head start on the season before the opening day without realizing they are disturbing the spawning period of the bass and their future populations. Any person catching bass out of season should immediately return them to the waters from which they came.

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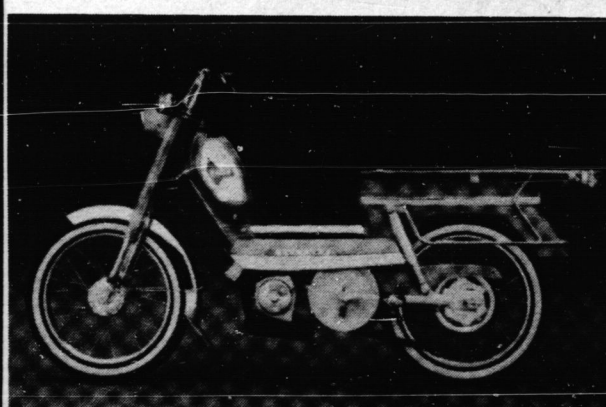
