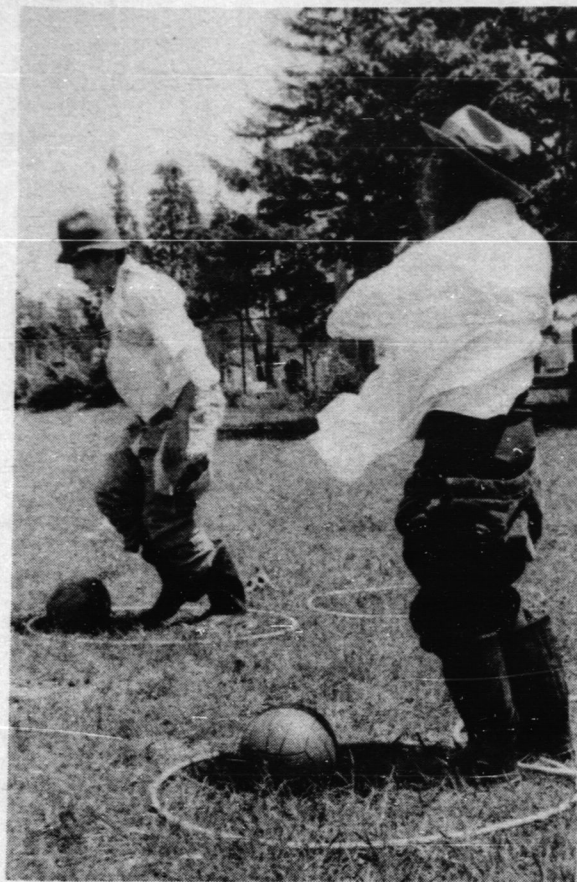

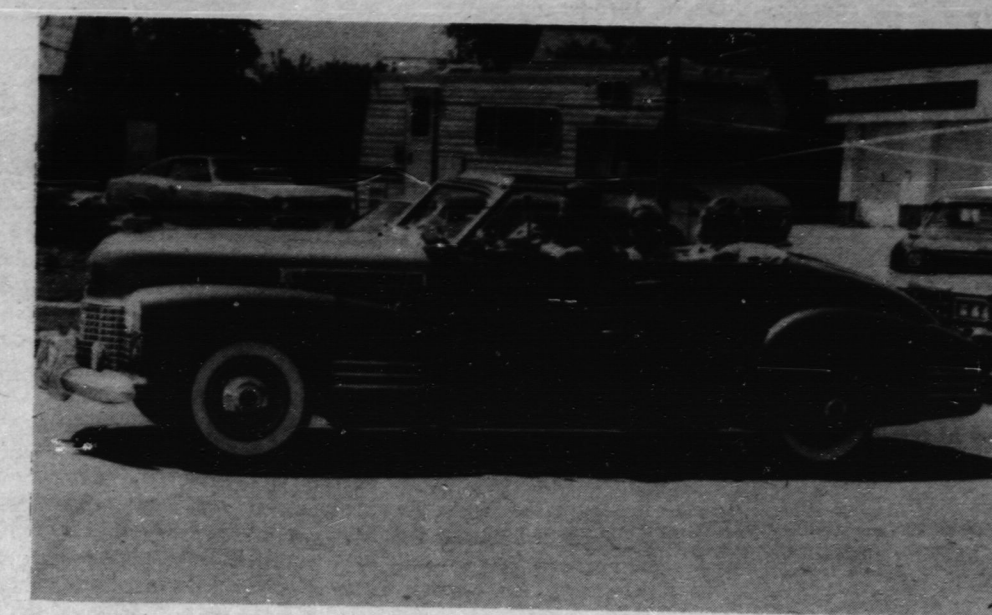

Information on High Yield Competitions sponsored by Haldimand Soil and Crop Improvement Association has been forwarded to members. Others interested are invited to inquire at the Cayuga agriculture office for information. High Yield Competitions will be held for the Wheat, Barley, Oat, Soybean and Corn Crops. A Master Corn Grower Competition is also announced. Entries are required by July 15.

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The July 5, Beef Improvement Association, Cow - Calf tour of Norfolk herds starts at 12:30 at the Hellyer Farms Santa Gertrudis herd. This herd is located near the intersection of the Thompson and Cockshutt roads north of Highway 3 from Renton. Other stops include Frank Bullock's farm south of Simcoe on Highway 24 and the Jack Slight farm on the East Quarter Line. The tour con-

cludes with a picnic at Deer Creek Dam. Beef producers from Brant, Haldimand, Wentworth and Niagara will be joining Norfolk producers on the tour.

Haldimand 4-H members will be taking part in a Judging Competition to be held at Dry Lake Saddle Club, Decewsville on Wednesday, July 9. The competition starts at 9:00 a.m. Five trophies and \$150 prize money are offered.
