

Juniors win 8-7

In a wild and woolly battle at Langton, the Hagersville Juniors came out on top with an 8-7 win in 10 innings. This was the second straight meeting between the teams in less than a week and the feelings were running a little high. With Hagersville leading 5-2 in the fourth inning, the first of the fireworks took place. The bases were loaded when coach Denny Wilson decided he would pull a rare triple steal with Tony Yacubino on the front end. As Tony raced home, the catcher applied a very hard tag to Tony's ear. Tony came up swinging at the catcher and both players were ejected. Some fans poured out the field but cooler heads kept things from turning into a real donnybrook.

Cliff Chrysler worked the first seven innings and was touched for 10 hits. Cliff struck out nine in the same stretch with several of them coming at opportune times. Cliff left in the eighth leading 7-5 as Roger Montour took over. Montour ran into control trouble in the ninth and loaded the bases. After walking in one run he was lifted in favour of Dan Galbraith. Peacock rapped a double to tie the score and

send the game into extra innings. With the bases loaded in the top of the 10th Glen Hewson came through with a base hit to plate the winning run.

The lead-off batter got as far as second base in the last of the 10th for Langton with only one out. Galbraith finished the game by striking out the last two men. Hewson had two hits for the winners as did Dan Donato, Paul Fryett, Yacubino, Steve Petracca, Craig McKeen, and Galbraith all had one hit.

In the game played at home on Thursday, Langton scored a run in the top of the ninth to go home with a 7-7 tie. Galbraith worked the full nine innings allowing 11 hits and six walks. Langton -

scored single runs in the first, third and ninth innings and added two runs in each of the fifth and sixth innings. Hagersville scored two runs in the second inning and added five in the sixth as they collected 13 hits. Craig McKeen led the attack with three safeties. Galbraith cracked a double and two singles with Jim Vanni and Hewson adding two hits each. Cornelle, the big Langton catcher, hit a triple and two singles to be the top man for the visitors. The Juniors play Tillsonburg at home this Thursday before heading for the All Ontario tournament in Thorold on the week-end. Jim Lamb, the versatile - player should be out with the team.

Phil Nie was near perfect as he spun a neat one-hitter in blanking Simcoe 11-0. Nie walked six men but struck out nine as his mates committed only one error. Nie was helped by a great catch the fifth inning when Richard Salvatore ran a long way into left center to pull down a ball Dennis Smith and Daryl Nixon teamed for a double play in another inning to protect the shut-out.

Hagersville scored in the first inning for the only run they needed but added three more in the fourth and seven in the fifth. Darrell Watson and Salvatore had two hits each to lead the eight hit attack. Nie, Hall Brown, Nixon and Mike Tarnack

picked up the balance of the hits. This was the second time Hagersville has beaten Simcoe this season and they are the only team in the league to do so.

On Sunday the bubble burst for the Midgets as they lost their first game of the season in Paris by a score of 8-3. Coach Nat Salvatore was very bitter over this loss figuring the umpires were not up to par. When we look at the stats for the game it looks more like the team was not up to par. This was the worst game they had played all season in the field and they could come up with only seven hits. Watson, Terry Crawford, Bill Winger, Paul Horvatis, Dennis Smith, Sal-

vatore and Brown were the only players to hit safely. Paris racked Winger for ten hits and three walks to go along with the errors for eight runs. Winger struckout six but this was a long way from his best effort. Maybe it was the warm weather. Get out to the ball park on any Wednesday and watch some good baseball. The boys deserve some support.
