

Jarvis Novice champs

The Jarvis Canadians are the Novice Champions as a result of their thrilling 5-4 win over the Rangers. Jarvis came to play hockey and jumped into a 3-0 first period lead. Billy Mumby scored the first goal for Jarvis when he tapped in Jeff McKeen's rebound. Two minutes later McKeen took a pass from Mumby and fired it past Ron Pepper. With 3 minutes left in the period McKeen got his second of the game when he scored an unassisted goal as the Rangers let him skate right through the entire team. Ron Pepper then settled down as well as getting

some help from the rest of the crew and the Rangers played better hockey in the second period.

The Canadians might have thought the Rangers were dead but they soon found out different. Wayne Fess was given a pass by John DeGraaf and made no mistake in flipping it past Bruce Nopper. A minute later Bill Mumby restored a three goal cushion for Jarvis and this is the way the period ended. The third period was all Rangers as they scored three times to send the game into overtime. With just two minutes gone in the period, Wayne Fess got the puck

over to Rick LaBrie and made it 4-2. LaBrie set up Fess at the five minute mark to make it 4-3. With time running out the Rangers put on the pressure. Fess got a loose puck at the blueline and stick handled in to beat Nopper for the tying goal.

In the first period of overtime Ron Pepper came up with two big saves on Mumby. Bruce Nopper had to stop Fess and Freddie Biggar on what looked like sure goals. Neither team could score in this period so the game went into sudden death overtime where the first goal scored wins for the team.

The teams battled for six

minutes before Billy Mumby went through the whole team to put the puck into the net for the Canadians. The Jarvis bench went wild, with Jim McKeen leading the team out to embrace Mumby and Nopper. This was a great game to win, but it was a heart-breaking loss for the Rangers. The Rangers gave their best but on this night were beaten by a better team. The three goals they gave up in the first period was too much to overcome. Rick Ostrowski must be congratulated for the great job he did with these kids and it is hoped he will be back next year.

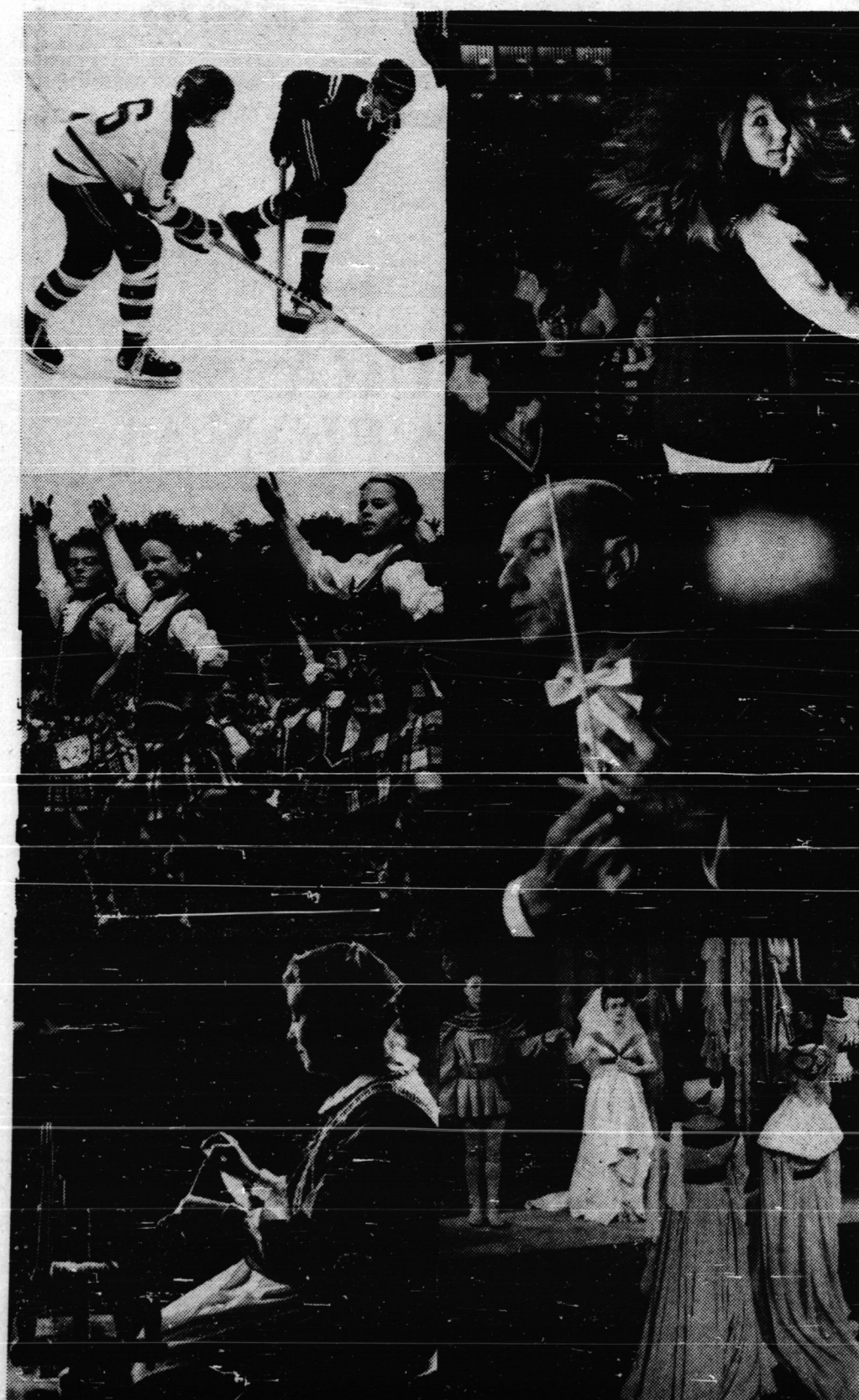

Ontario is the best place in Canada to get a higher education. Why? First, the range and diversity of programs our institutions offer. Second, the Ontario Government programs that help students finance their education. Already, 2 out of 5 students at Ontario colleges and universities are receiving financial aid through the Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP). OSAP assists full-time post-secondary students with government-financed loans and grants

based on need, not on academic achievement.

Now, starting with the 1975-76 academic year, there will be two new programs.

The Ontario Student Loans Plan is designed to help students who are ineligible for aid from OSAP. It will benefit part-time students, some students enrolled in upgrading programs and those taking programs which are shorter, or have different entry standards than required by OSAP regulations.

The Ontario Special Bursary Program gives non-repayable grants to people in serious financial need, particularly those who can improve their financial situation by taking one or more courses. It's designed for part-time students who receive social assistance, are unemployed, or who have a low family income.
