## Editorial

## Council boosts pay

Last week members of regional council passed a Members of Council Budget in the amount of \$159,805.

On the surface, this seems to be a rather harmless piece of information, and had it not been for Simcoe Mayor Alfred Judd, it might well have escaped the notice of members of the press.

The "Members of Council Budget" is a fancy phrase for a pay hike of eight per cent for regional councillors.

Councillor Judd said there was no use in "trying to sneak it through", and that a spade might as well be called a spade - or for that matter - a pay hike, a pay hike.

I am not against regional councillors receiving an extra \$520 a year. In fact, I believe they deserve it.

These men and women take time from their busy schedules to attend regional council every second and fourth Thursday of the month for approximately three to four hours trying to whip our region into shape.

Beyond Thursday's meetings, many of these councillors also sit on committees, such as the engineering committee, the finance and administration committee, the planning and development committee, and the health and social services committee. Most of these meetings take place at night and go on for three hours. This means they lose a great deal of time that the rest of us enjoy with our families.

They also take complaints. They are the ones who receive telephone calls when you finally get sick and tired of the mess your road is in. They are the ones who get told about dogs running loose in the village. They have to listen to irate callers who disagree with something that was said or passed in council.

Any type of government official is painted as a big black man. Probably because we all tend to believe that any one who tries to govern us or lay down the rules is infringing on our rights as an individual. However, someone has to make up the rules. Be glad it's them and not you or I, buddy!

We all let off steam once in a while and say how much better we could run things if we were one of the big boys. Well, I'd run a country mile if someone had the nerve to offer me a job as regional councillor.

I am in full agreement with regional councillors getting an eight per cent pay increase. I feel they deserve it. They run around, take a lot of flack from the people they represent, and never seem to get a thanks for what they do.

Thank you, regional councillors. However, I think it was a bit of a dirty trick to try and pass that budget under our noses without saying just exactly what it was. Why call it a "Member of council Budget" if it's a pay hike?

Councillor Catherine Smale spoke up and said that pay boosts should be tied to a policy - such as salaries rising with the cost of living. I can only agree with her. When salaries are increased - and apparently for no real reason - it seems unfair to taxpayers. If however, policy were laid down that stated regional councillors would receive pay hikes similar to the rise in the cost of living, this would be acceptable.

Dunnville Mayor Charles Lundy felt that the term should be served before there was any talk of salary increases.

This, too, I agree with. It would be best if councillors were to receive the cost of living allowance at the end of each year.

I cannot condone, however, the method in which the finance and administration committee tried to slip the recommendation through unnoticed.

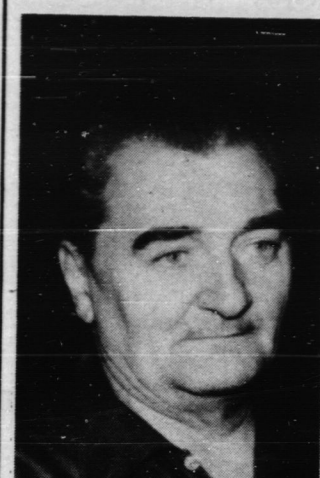
