Dear Friends,
During the month of April, I was not too involved in the House of Commons debates because the House did not reconvene after the Easter Recess until April 7. Then, on April 21, our Member went to Italy as a member of a Parliamentary delegation.

Highlights of Italian Visit

The delegation to Italy was led by the Minister of Veteran Affairs, the Hon. Daniel MacDonald, and included over three hundred members, the majority of whom were veterans of the Italian Campaign and presently members of Veterans Organizations.

We were in Italy for twelve

days and visited a total of eighteen Canadian War Cemeteries, all beautifully maintained by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission. With the group was the R.C.R. Band from Canada, the Band of the Royal 22nd Regiment from Germany in scarlet tunics and busbys, a small Pipe band and two R.C.M.P. Constables. These units helped to make a very colourful ceremony at the cemeteries. The Italian citizens of the communities visited attended in large numbers.

Another highlight of the tour was the Band Tattoo on two occasions at the city City Squares in Rimini and Ravenna, which were also

much appreciated by the citizens of these cities.

We had only two free days, which gave us the opportunity of guided tours of Venice and Rome to view the historical and traditional landmarks. While in Rome we were privileged to have a general audience with His Holiness the Pope.

During the entire visit we enjoyed beautiful sunny weather with temperature in the low 70's. The long ceremonies where one stood for well over an hour were a bit tiresome, but all in all it was a memorable pilgrimage to honour our fallen comrades.

Legislation before the House

Virtually every piece of legislation which is introduced by the government suggests that a new administrative structure must be established. The new Grain Stabilization Act, which is presently being considered, is another such example.

Under this very complicated bill a new organization is to be established. While the principle of stabilization is acceptable to all the opposition parties of the House, the expansion of government by the formation of an addition-

al administrative group is totally unacceptable. It is at a time like this when a Member of the Opposition is damned no matter which way he votes. He is price stabilization in the grainfield and he will be damned by his own conscience if he votes for an additional department by his own conscience if he votes for an additional department of government. We can well do without further growth in the bureaucracy.

Senior Citizens

The Federal Department of Health has announced that identification cards will be issued to all Old Age Security recipients. However, it will take several months to distribute them to nearly two million senior citizens. This bill, however, the registration of firearms by itself will not prevent criminals from obtaining firearms for acts of violence. In other words the bill will not accomplish the purpose for which it was designed. It is for this reason that I and other members of the caucus are unalterably opposed to such legislation.

Senate Bill S-14

This bill is an Act to amend the Criminal Code for the control of weapons and firearms. This is the third time this bill has been introduced by the Senate and it is entirely

unlikely that it will ever be enacted into law. There has been considerable correspondence from the riding concerning the restrictions placed on firearms with reference to hunting, pistol clubs, trap clubs, and others.

I brought the subject of this bill to the attention of our caucus, and there was overwhelming opinion opposing Senate Bill S-14. There are one or two favourable features of this bill to the attention of our.

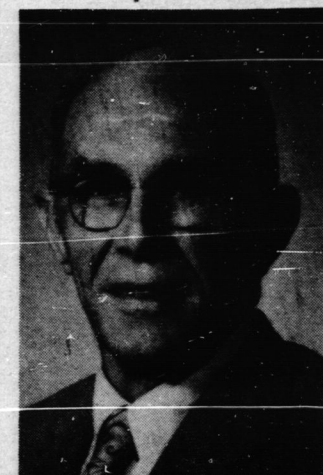
Obituary
