November 2 was a great and exciting day for the local Congregation, observing 119 years of Christian ordinances in this area.

A history of the congregation just fresh off the Press at the latter part of last week in this for the special Sunday helped to make visible the faith of the Church people through the years. The second paragraph of this handsome little history production begins (and quite properly so) with the words: "Through the years Knox Church has had far-reaching influence in the life of the Village of Jarvis and of the entire community." Since the organization of the Congregation in 1856 as a Charge within a Presbytery of the Free Church of Scotland there have been just 15 clergy called as ministers of the 2-point Charge of Chalmers - Walpole and Knox - Jarvis.

The speaker for the day was the son of one of these previous ministers from 1929 to 1938, Rev. G. L. Evans. Son Dillwyn T. Evans, with the honours of a grateful church following his career of dedicated service across the years since he left the Jarvis area as a high school graduate, came to the services of Knox Anniversary as a former Chairman of the present Board of World Missions, a past Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and presently serving as Missions superintendent for his church in the Province of Saskatchewan since June of 1975.

Arriving in Jarvis about 9.45 Sunday morning from a busy three days at Goderich, Dr. Evans quickly renewed memories of other years and spoke to the congregation of near-capacity in the Knox sanctuary, many of whom were boyhood friends, on the subject "anniversary and Life." Briefly his words

included the contrast between the meaning of that ancient Greek word IMMORTALITY, which suggests life as it is going on and on and on with Biblical word RESURRECTION which informs us that WE SHALL BE CHANGED. From the moment you are a Believer you begin living in a new dimension. The son or daughter of the old Adam is transformed into a son or daughter of God through the power and authority of the Christ.

After a quiet, pleasant, restful day of sharing in two of the home, Dr. Evans returned to an appreciative congregation, many of them coming back for the second service at 7:30 in the evening where he spoke about three kinds of people: THOSE WHO MAKE THINGS HAPPEN, THOSE WHO LIKE WATCHING THINGS HAPPEN and THOSE WHO DON'T KNOW WHAT'S HAPPENING. The chapter on the valley of dry bones in Ezekiel 37 (which has become famous as a Spiritual added pathos to the third category and hopes that by the grace of God they might take their place with those who make things happen. That might be termed as the basic purpose of the Christian Church to-day, helping people leave the life of futility and enter into that more abundant life which Christ came to offer us.

The daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Ken Bousfield provided beautiful sacred harmony in the morning with two numbers, an arrangement of "Holy, Holy, Holy" and "Something Beautiful". Ms. Cathie, Susanne, and Mary Lou Bousfield provided a witness in sacred song that helped make the vision of 119 years a real blessing.

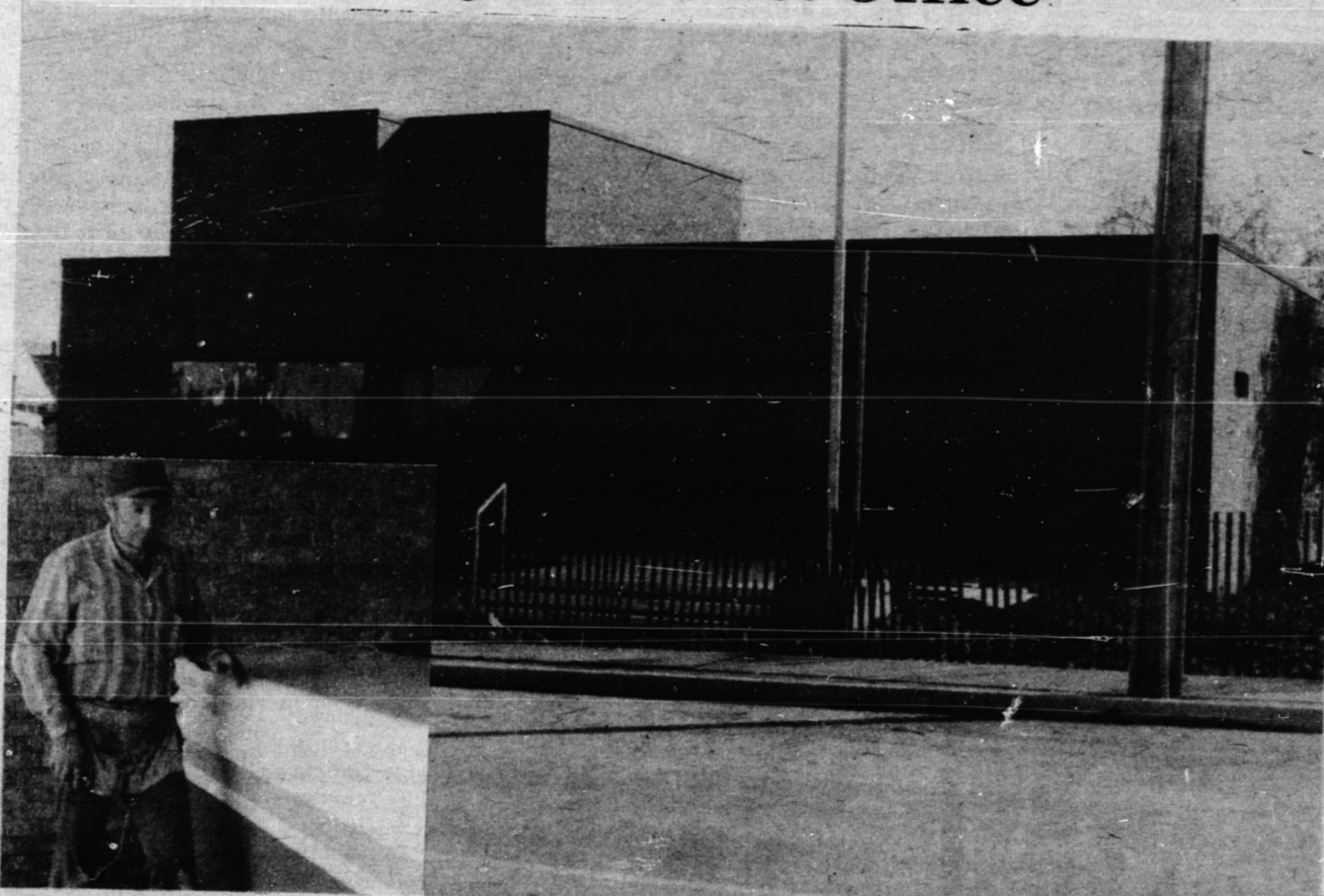
The Knox choir rendered sacred inspiration during the evening including the 2 songs, "Just a closer walk with Thee," and "The Vesper Hymn."

ONTARIO PROVINCIAL POLICE CAYUGA DETACHMENT

On October 28th, a break and enter occurred at the residence of George Best, R. R. 2 Hagersville, Ontario. Entry was gained by an unlocked rear window. One of two juveniles responsible were apprehended by Mr. Best. One week prior to this date, the same residence was entered with \$30 in cash and one carton of cigarettes were stolen. The same two juveniles were responsible for this entry.

On October 26th, a vehicle

stolen from Sprucedale Training School with \$300 cash inside vehicle, was recovered in Niagara Falls after the vehicle had been driven to London. Three escapees from the school were responsible. The \$300 was not recovered.

On October 27th the R.F. Almas Co. Ltd of Hagersville reported that 10 plate glass windows valued at \$750 were broken out of the road building equipment parked at the Explorer Inn in Jarvis.

Quigley Construction also had two windows broken.

On October 28th, Prov. Const. R. Horton and Corporal B. Brown investigated what first appeared as a robbery with violence at Port Maitland. At the conclusion of the investigation, Fred Case and Larry Dolan, both of Dunnville were charged with "Assault Causing Bodily harm".

On October 31st, Halloween night, 20 O.P.P. officers which included the Aux-

iliary Police, patrolled the rural area's under the Cayuga detachment's jurisdiction. It was one of the quietest Halloween nights in recent years. A large crowd gathered in the Village of Selkirk but cooler heads prevailed and no serious incidents were reported. Nine charges were laid for having liquor in a place other than residence. The O.P.P. would like to congratulate the young people in this area especially those in the Village of Jarvis.
