On the Farm Front

Individual farmers or groups of farmers may qualify for assistance with transportation of ewe or ewe lambs under the federal-provincial sheep assistance program. If shipments of 100 ewes or ewe lambs or more are bought in Western Canada for use in a breeding herd then two-thirds of the railway freight or trucking charges are repaid under the program in the case of ewes or all of the charges in the case of ewe lambs.

Production testing is one of the best management tools that a dairyman can have. Results if the test information is used can mean many dollars. The dollars come from extra production, from better use of the feed dollar and from increased prices for cattle sold.
