SEMINARS

The growth-related seminars being conducted throughout the Haldimand-Norfolk Regional Municipality are "ten years too late!" a citizen declared at the November 19 seminar in Hagersville.

The general aura of the audience (less than 25) was that corporation, developers and the government have already planned out the future of this area. And that the persons not knowing what is happening are the local residents - some of them feeling the brunt of recent changes.

Sam Lanfranco, McMaster University, conducted the fifth in-a-series of eight-such seminars. A similar meeting was held in Simcoe on November 12.

Mr. Lanfranco showed a film which depicted various stages of planning and redevelopment in Bramalea.

He admitted he did not know the answer to a question-raised from the floor: "Who's manipulating whom?" (regarding government and major corporations). Economic forces, he said, are "not being hostile"... they are "just doing what they have to." And if one large corporation come into an area - the others have to do so as well.

Mr. Lanfranco pointed out that solutions to problems arising from growth have not been found. And that an instance of related rapid-growth problems could be seen in Toronto.

Members of the Haldimand-Norfolk Regional Board of Commissioners of Police are "disturbed by the allegation of police misconduct reported in Simcoe Reformer in the past two weeks," says a commission press release (dated November 21).

And at a press gathering on that date, Judge W. W. Leach, chairman of the board of commissioners, said that the Ontario Police Commission (OPC) will carry out an inquiry under section 56 (1) (6) of the Police Act.

"The terms of reference under this section are very wide and will enable the inquiry to deal with all types of allegations of wrong doing," says the commission press release.

Judge Leach explained that a complaint has three courses of action:

Inquiry

complain to the Board and they (the Board) would investigate.

lay a charge in Criminal Court issue a writ for damages. He also said that the "Board is unable to answer any questions pertaining to allegations." But that the results of the inquiry are to be made public shortly thereafter. He added that he did not know how much of the detail would be publicized.

Provincially-appointed Board member, Donald E. Schott, confirmed that because the OPC has been "exceedingly busy" the earliest possible date for the inquiry would be January.

The press release also cites that the Board had only nine weeks to organize the new Regional Force following the amalgamation of the eight municipal forces last year: "Under the new organization, all the former eight police chiefs were reduced in rank which is a severe blow. In Haldimand County one police chief was reduced to a sergeant and the other two to first class constables. Many sergeants were reduced to constables as well. To their credit, these men have served the Force admirably ever since."

With further regard to the reported allegation in the press, the release says that "these articles are affecting the morale of the Force and causing distrust in some of the public."

Judge Leach concluded the meeting with the press by saying: "What this Board is interested in is arriving at the truth..."

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

The Head Office of the Ontario Flue-Cured Tobacco Growers' Marketing Board transmitted by telephone, to my office, a resolution passed by a group of tobacco farmers regarding the present tobacco market. I enclose herewith a copy of that resolution.

I sent copies of the resolution, along with a covering letter urging action, to the Hon. Andre Ouellet, Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs and to the Hon. Eugene Whelan, Minister of Agriculture. In addition, I spoke briefly with Mr. Ouellet personally on the matter and will do the same with Mrs. Whelan upon his return to Ottawa.

Yesterday I moved a motion in the House of Commons asking for a debate on the question. Enclosed please find a copy of Hansard for November 19th, containing this motion, (see page 9232).

Copies of the resolution were also sent to the following Members: John Wise, Bruce Halliday, Derek Blackburn, Allan Lawrence, Larry Condon, and J.R. Holmes. If the matter is not soon resolved, I shall endeavour to get this group together to meet jointly with one or both of the Cabinet Ministers mentioned, in order to further press for possible action by the Federal Government.

This is a Motion that was brought up from the floor at a meeting of five hundred tobacco farmers at the Tillsonburg Auction Exchange on November 17, 1975, moved by Mrs. Margaret Mudford, seconded by Mrs. Helen Solga: WHEREAS the cost of production of flue-cured tobacco has increased from 1974 to 1975;

AND WHEREAS the price of cigarettes was increased in 1974 to the consumer;

AND WHEREAS the price of cigarettes has not been decreased to the consumer in 1975;

AND WHEREAS the buyers of Ontario Flue-Cured Tobacco are paying less on the Auction Markets than was paid at the same date last year;

AND WHEREAS there is much farmer dissatisfaction with the current market prices;

AND WHEREAS the farmers closed the Auction Warehouses pending some resolution of this matter; BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that this meeting hereby petitions the Ministry of Corporate and Consumer Affairs, the Hon. Andre Ouellet, Minister, that an immediate investigation be launched into the buying practices and prices paid for Ontario Flue-Cured Tobacco on the auction floors, and the pricing of cigarettes to the consumer in Canada, and further that an investigation be launched into the export of Canadian Flue-Cured Tobacco and its possible curtailment through the pricing methods being used by the companies.

This Motion was carried with one opposed.

in removing controls in communities where the apartment vacancy rate reached three or four per cent. "But it seems that with the growth of community, particularly urban, this rent control is a responsibility which the House must accept."

In his opinion, "anybody who thinks this sort of legislation is going to be sloughed off with a resurgence of the free enterprise system is in error." He also predicted that the government will have to accept an increasing role in providing funds for housing.

He also predicted that the government will have to accept an increasing role in providing funds for housing because of existing government programmes have failed to persuade enough private-sector builders to meet housing needs. Liberal MPP Eddie Sargent (Grey-Bruce) warned no more apartments will be built by the private sector once the rent control machinery is in place. He

also to be reduced on the Provinces Highways to 60 mph on the expressways and to 50 mph on other highways. Legislation is not necessary for the reduction of speed limits and the new limit will be in effect as soon as the new signs can be erected, which officials estimate will be in a month.

Mandatory Wearing of Seat-belts

The government has introduced legislation to make mandatory the wearing of automobile seat belts as of January 1. People convicted of breaking the law will be liable to a fine of \$20 to \$100. Exemptions will be made for infants, people who must get in and out of cars often such as police and firemen and those who cannot wear the belts for medical reasons, etc. Chief motivation for the legislation is the suffering and death resulting from the soaring hospital cost involved. Ottawa Liberal MPP Albert Roy has twice introduced a private members' Bill to provide for mandatory seat-belt use, and the government's legislation is very similar to his proposed amendment to the Highway Traffic Act. Speed limits are

also, although he has stressed that domestic consumers will be given priority. He has, however, indicated that any shortages will not last very long providing new supplies from the north become available. The minister has resisted opposition polls for new Ontario controls on gas prices, while not entirely ruling out the possibility of a further price freeze, with penalties, if "too many" operators raise prices by more than the 5.4 cents per gallon recommended by the government.
