## Freezing Apples

Apples freeze well, with or without the addition of sugar say food specialists at the Ontario Food Council, Ministry of Agriculture and Food.

Select firm, ripe apples, free from bruises and decay. The crisp, well-flavored apple varieties, such as Northerns Spy, Wealthy and McIntosh are best suited to freezing in slices. The softer varieties can be used for applesauce.

Prepare a brine solution (2 teaspoons salt to 1 quart water) to prevent discoloration while slicing. Pare, quarter, core and slice the apples into the brine. To avoid imparting a salty flavor to the apples, soak for only a few minutes. Drain before packing.

Pack in dry sugar, using 1 cup sugar to 4 cups prepared apples. Or prepare applesauce as for table use; cool

and pack, leaving 1 inch headspace.

Ascorbic acid, an anti-darkening agent, can be added to the apples to prevent them from discoloration. Dissolve 1/4 teaspoon powdered or crystalline ascorbic acid in 1/4 cup cold water. Sprinkle over each 4 cups of prepared apples. Mix gently before adding the sugar.

of Air Products division in Canada, said that the contract represents the culmination of negotiations with Stelco which began in mid-1974.

Air Products will construct a multi-million-dollar 1200-ton-per-day separation plant to produce oxygen, nitrogen and argon. The plant is scheduled to be completed in the summer of 1977.

In addition to supplying up to 900 tons per day of oxygen and nitrogen by pipeline for Stelco's new steel mill, the plant will be able to produce 300 tons per day of liquid oxygen, nitrogen and argon for the Ontario and Quebec markets.

The gases will be used in food freezing, metalworking, welding, chemical, plastics,

electronics and other applications.

The plant will be one of the first enterprises to be located in the Lake Erie industrial park being developed by Stelco on land adjacent to its steel mill.

The industrial park represents a new and advanced approach to industrial development, which includes strict environmental standards and planned recreational areas.

Air Products and Chemicals Inc. operates more than 50 industrial gas facilities and 10 chemical plants in North America, Europe and South Africa. The corporation's sales in the 12 months ended June, 1975, were \$674,000,000.

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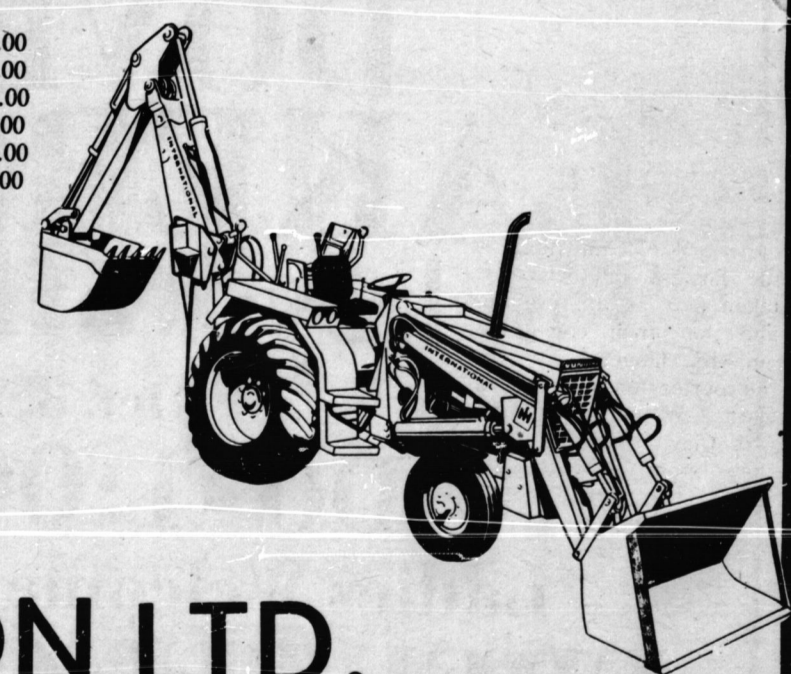


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## Lambs Corners

## JOINT HIGHWAY 6 UTILITY CORRIDOR NANTICOKE TO CALEDONIA INFORMATION CENTRES

In May of this year, the Ministry of Transportation and Communications announced the decision to proceed with the design of a Joint Highway 6 - Utility Corridor between Nanticoke and Caledonia.

The Ministry has since been developing detailed plans for the corridor with the assistance of the utility agencies.

Detailed plans have now been developed for the alternative routes shown on the map.

The detailed plans are currently being analyzed on the basis of the economic, social, environmental and associated transportation impacts of the various alternatives. At this point in time the Ministry of Transportation and Communications wishes to obtain the comments of the area residents concerning the alternatives.

In order to permit area residents to review the plans, make their comments and state their preferences, arrangements have been made to hold Information Centres in Hagersville, Jarvis and Caledonia.

Area residents are invited to attend the Information Centres in their area. The locations and dates of the Information Centres are as follows:
