Norfolk Township may pull out of region

Township of Norfolk pulling out of the Region of Haldimand-Norfolk loomed as a reality at Norfolk Council last Thursday night.

The matter was touched off when council was studying some Interim Planning Guidelines sent out by the region. These guidelines forcasted that the growth of Port Rowan over the next six years would not be more than

Clerk-Administrator for the township Robert Loncke said that this growth worked out to approximately 60 housing units over this period of time. Fifty units have already been okayed for a subdivision in Port Rowan, so that the projected figure would allow for almost no growth beyond what has already been approved.

Councillor Lorne Hunter said that it was obvious from this report that the Township of Norfolk was not getting it's proper recognition in the planning of the region.
