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On The Farm Front

Ontario Wheat Producers' Marketing Board advises that last year the board exported over 10 million bushels of a 19 million bushel wheat crop. This year's crop yielded over 21 million bushels. It is expected that 13 or 14 million bushels of the 1975 crop will have to be sold on the export market.

September rain records indicate a variation across Haldimand from about 3.5 to 4.5 inches of rain. Rainfall must have felt that rainfall amounted to more than that total.

An egg marketing expression of opinion poll is to be conducted October 14 to 17 inclusive. Information about the questions on the ballot and the certificate that is assigned to eligible voters has been delivered to those who may cast a ballot. Ballots will be cast at the county agriculture offices from 9:00

a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on any of the October 14, 15, 16, & 17 dates.

The era of plentiful and cheap energy may be at an end. Energy or the lack of it could become the major limiting factor to agricultural production. With these thoughts in mind an Energy Management Resource Centre has been opened at Ridgeway College of Agricultural Technology.

One of the first objectives is to encourage and promote energy conserving attitudes. The Centre will also establish an educational program an energy conservation methods Conrad Odegaard will head up the program as provincial energy management specialist for agriculture.

Indications from high yield competition data and from farmer reports to date are that the 1975 corn crop will yield as well as or better than

some of the highest yields in previous years.

Local plowing matches are to be held on October 11 and 16. The Haldimand Match on Thursday, October 16 will be at the farm of James Tomlinson - one-half mile east of Empire in Seneca. We are expecting a report soon on the location of the October 11 Oncaida Plowing Match.
