Vandals strike student's bus

A bus owned by the students of Hagersville District Secondary School was struck by vandals last week who slashed all the seats in the bus with a razor blade.

The damage was discovered last Thursday afternoon when the students boarded the bus to go the Waterford for a football game.

Damage to the bus was estimated at several hundred dollars by school principal Derek Bishop, who said that all seats in the 24 passenger

bus would have to be re-upholstered.

The students had bought the bus with money raised by fund-raising projects of the student council. The students paid \$7000. for the bus.

"Whoever did this, wasn't attacking boards of education or anything, but they were attacking the students of this school," said Mr. Blackburn.

The incident is being investigated by Constable Mowat of the Haldimand-Norfolk Regional Police.

Members of the Parish are looking forward to renewing acquaintance with their

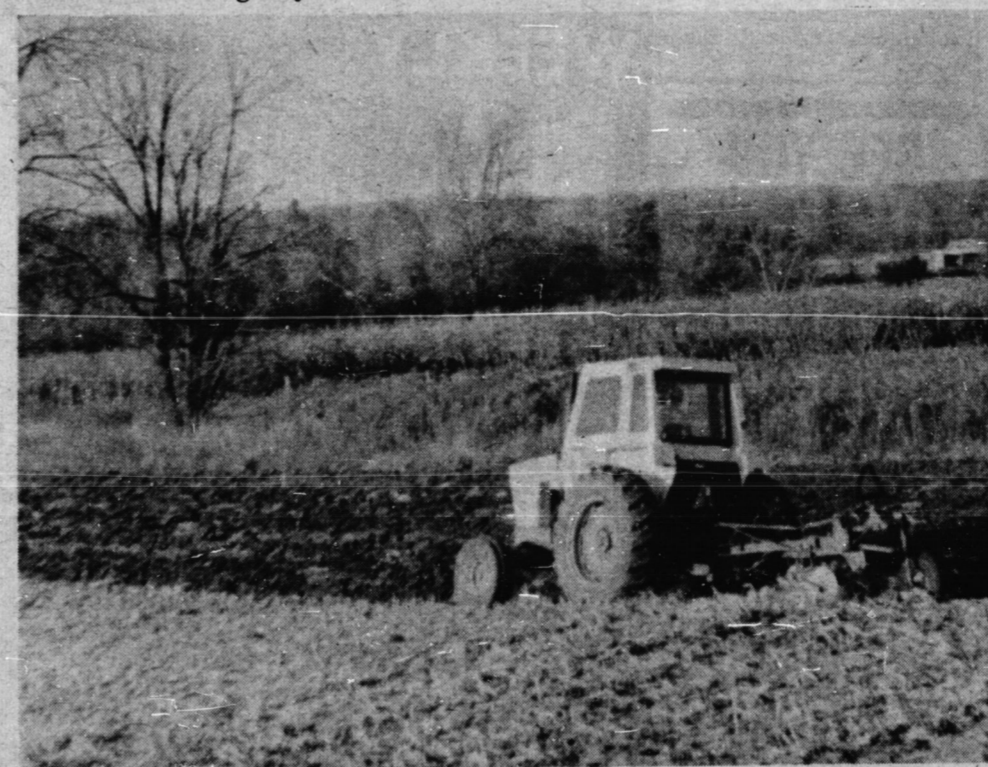
Norfolk Unit C.C.S.
