OF PERSONS ENTITLED TO DIRECT TAXES FOR SCHOOL SUPPORT PURPOSES

Notice is hereby given that pursuant to Section 23 of The Assessment Act the Assessment Commissioner of Assessment Region No. 20 has delivered to the clerk of the City of Nanticoke a list showing the school support of every inhabitant who is entitled to direct taxes for school support purposes.

Section 516 of The Municipal Act provides in part as follows:

"In ascertaining the names and school support of all persons assessed for the purpose of preparation of the collector's roll, the clerk, in addition to the index book provided for by Section 60 of The Separate Schools Act, shall be guided by the list supplied to him under Section 23 of The Assessment Act, as revised and certified."

A person or his authorized agent may apply to the clerk of the municipality to have his name included in the list or to have the information contained therein corrected if it is in error.

Every person applying for an alteration of school support as shown on the list shall sign an application in the prescribed form in which all the information shall be sufficiently filled in, either by the applicant or by the clerk at the applicant's request.

ALL PERSONS WHO ARE ENTITLED TO DIRECT TAXES FOR SCHOOL SUPPORT PURPOSES ARE HEREBY CALLED UPON TO EXAMINE THE LIST AND TO TAKE IMMEDIATE PROCEEDINGS TO CORRECT ANY ERRORS OR OMISSIONS THEREIN.

THE LAST DAY FOR FILING APPLICATIONS IS NOVEMBER 14, 1975.

The list will be posted and prescribed application forms obtained at the Clerk's Office, 230 Main Street, Port Dover, Ontario.

The place at which the revision will commence is the Clerk's Office, 230 Main Street, Port Dover, Ontario.

The time at which the revision will commence is 9:00 a.m., Monday, November 3, 1975.

Revision of the list will take place during normal office hours, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday to Friday (excluding Tuesday, November 11, 1975, Remembrance Day.)

**Suppression**

The fight for the right of the public to know what goes on in all forms of government has been carried on for many years both by newspapers and the general public as well.

In the United States there are strict laws prohibiting the holding of secret meetings, and protecting the freedom of the press. This promotes a free wheeling attitude among the press in United States which up to now has not existed in Canada.

But this may all change, in the near future as the result of the work of the editor of a weekly newspaper in the little town of Alliston, Ont.

Creation of a public knowledge board, and a public right to know act, were proposed by David Willis, editor of the weekly Alliston Herald. He said the board should have authority to fine officials who withhold public information.

One can only wonder what effect this would have on many of our local politicians who have such a fondness for holding meetings in committee, releasing vague committee reports, or not releasing the reports at all.

These people are spending the public's money and the public has a right to know exactly what they are spending it on, and how they are spending it.

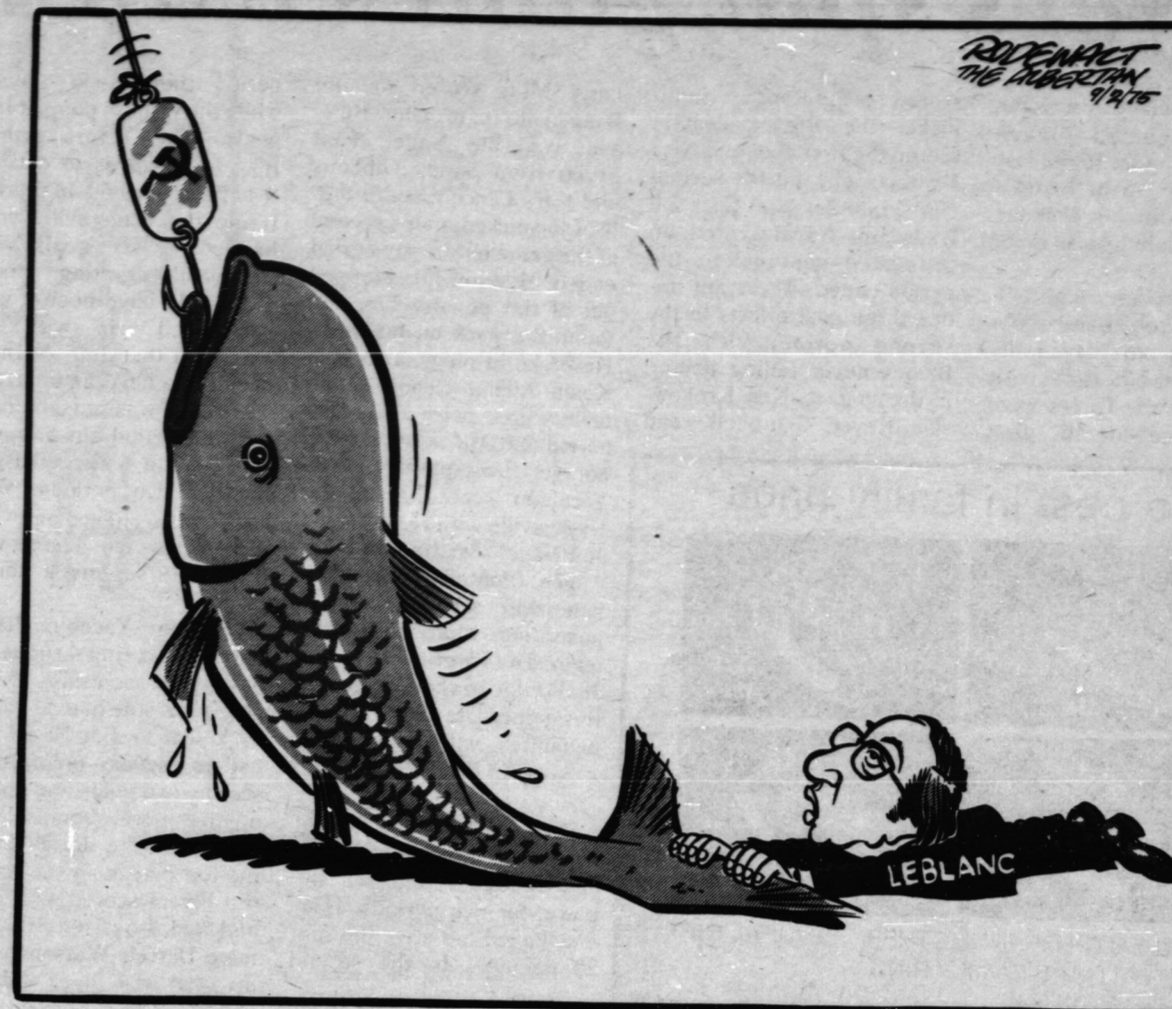
Mr. Willis said the board, similar to the Ontario Municipal Board, would allow anyone to appeal against secrecy from whatever cause by any member of a statutory body. It would insist upon publicity where necessary.

He said the right to know act would over-ride existing legislation and clarify ambiguities. It would ensure all public meetings be open except under clearly-defined conditions which must be cited before closure.

Mr. Willis made the proposal to a meeting of the Association of Counties and Regions of Ontario.

He said secretiveness is incompatible with the public participation essential to democracy. Without public discussion the country will be left with a sterile bureaucracy from which will spring the poisonous nettles of dictatorship.

Suppression of correspondence the calling of special meetings without anyone being told, and council minutes which are nonexistent or worded so as to tell the public nothing were among the practices attacked by Mr. Willis.
