Suppression

The fight for the right of the public to know wht goes on n all forms of government has been carried on for many years both by newspapers and the general public as

In the United States there are strict laws prohibiting the holding of secret meetings, and protecting the freedom of the press. This promotes a free wheeling attitude among the press in United States which up to now has not existed in Canada.

But this may all change, in the near future as the result of the work of the editor of a weekly newspaper in the little town of Allsiton, Ont.

Creation of a public knowledge board, and a public right to know act, were proposed by David Willis, editor of the weekly Alliston Herald, He said the board should have authority to fine officials who withhold public

One can only wonder what effect this would have on nany of our local politicians who have such a fondness for holding meetings in committee, releasing vague committee reports, or not releasing the reports at all. These people are spending the public's money and the public has a right to know exactly what they are spending it on, and how they are spending it.


Mr. Willis said the board, similar to the Ontario Municipal Board, would allow anyone to appeal against secrecy from whatever cause by any member of a statutory body. It would insist upon publicity where

He said the right to know act would-over-ride existing legislation and clarify ambiguities. It would ensure all public meetings be open except under clearly-defined onditions which must be cited before closure.

Mr. Willis made the proposal to a meeting of the Association of Counties and Regions of Ontario. He said secretiveness is incompatible with the public participation essential to democracy. Without public discussion the country will be left with a sterile
