

Flyers split games with Beamsville

The Hagersville Flyers split their two games played against Beamsville in the last week, losing 7-6 in Beamsville before winning at home on Sunday night by a score of 14-7.

On Monday night in Beamsville the Blades out hustled and out played the Flyers and were full credit for the win, the Flyers were in the game for the first

scored 2-1. Randy Nunn-maker the Blades captain scored the first goal and Nick Kryzanowsky got the second goal 2 minutes later for a 2-0 lead. Jim Nagel scored an unassisted goal before the period ended. The team traded three goal efforts in the second period with the Blades never falling behind in the contest. Ken Krukowski, Kevin Campbell, and

Larry Mills scored for the Beamsville team. Glen Hewson from Bill Nagel, Paul Fryett from Sandy Gibbons and Gary Lance made it 5-3. Hewson picked up his second of the game before the period ended. Hewson just stepped out of the penalty box and found the puck on his stick. He broke in on goal to beat Kevin Alioan cleanly. Both team scored twice in the last period but the Flyers could not get the equalizer. Tony Yacobino scored twice for Hagersville with Hewson and Jim Nagel assisting on both. Angoe Pontello and Pete Lampman scored the last goals for the Beamsville team. The Flyers held a slim 38-34 edge in shots on goal in this game. The teams split 16 penalties with Hagersville picking up the only major.

Playing before 400 fans at home the Flyers came to play and really turned on the power for two periods. Hagersville led 5-0 after the first 20 minutes. In the second

period they stood around while the visitors popped in 4 goals. The Flyers scored three themselves to make it 8-4 after 2 periods. In the last frame the Hagersville crew banged in six goals with Beamsville getting three. This could have been a very one sided win with the exception that Jeff Warnock decided to have another bad game. Jeff was sensational in the first period but then was the victim of 5 easy goals in the last two periods. Warnock had no chance on two of the goals as one scored with the Flyers serving a double penalty.

Anthony Yacobino had a big night scoring 4 times and picking up one assist. With 5 goals he still had to take a back seat to Jim Nagel who had a seven point night scoring two goals and setting up five more. Dennis Smith who would be my choice as the top player on the ice for the Flyers scored two goals and had 4 assists. His linemate Darrell Watson picked up a hat trick to go with two assists. Roger Montour had two goals and two assists plus one of the hardest checks handed out in any league. Roger caught Randy Nunnamer with his head down in the first period and really set him on his rear. This came early in the game and took a lot of fire out of the Beamsville captain. Doug Longland teamed with Paul Fryett for a goal and Kevin Smith set up Dennis Smith for one of the prettiest goals of the night. Smith finished off a nifty play as Watson and he threw the puck back and forth 4 times before tipping it in the net.

Mike Agnew was the top scorer for Beamsville with 2 goals and 2 assists. Nick Kryzanowski had 2 goals and one assist with Derek Two-cock getting one goal and 2 assists. Pete Lampman rounded out the scoring with a goal and one assist. Referee Tony Stayaert had his hands full in this game handing out 40 penalties 20 to each team. Hagersville had one major penalty and the visitors sat out a game misconduct.

Coach Jim Hall remarked that the two games with Beamsville were the best officiated games he has seen this year. This could well be as home brew Paul Kett was working the one game. When asked how his team could look so good one game and so bad the next Jim said "They

just wanted the game more than we did in Beamsville." Jim also said "We have a young defence, and they will make mistakes. I am hoping by the ninth or tenth game that they will jell and with the fire power up front we will be hard to beat." ... Hagersville held a 62-34 edge in shots on goal ...

On the farm front

Consumers will be paying more for beef in the next few years because of a shortage of cattle according to an agriculture Canada report released in mid-October.

The report issued by the department's economics branch says the imminent beef shortage will be the result of heavy slaughter of breeding animals in late 1974 and throughout 1975 -- a trend expected to continue into 1976. Cows and heifers are being shipped to the slaughter-house by producers hard hit by low calf prices during this period of beef surplus. This reduction in the breeding herd will mean a smaller calf crop beginning probably in 1976 and eventually a shortage of beef in two to three years.

Plans are underway for the annual fall corn night to be held at St. Michael's Parish Hall, Dunnville, on Monday evening, December 1. Other dates of interest include the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair, November 14 to 22 and the area can crop growers' Association annual meeting to be held at Inman Road Hall, Dunnville, on Friday evening, November 14.

The recent Haldimand Holstein Club sale held at the farm of Blake Stadder, Selkirk brought an average of \$718. High price at the sale

was \$1500. The 1975 sale average amounted to \$79 more per head than in the previous year's sale.

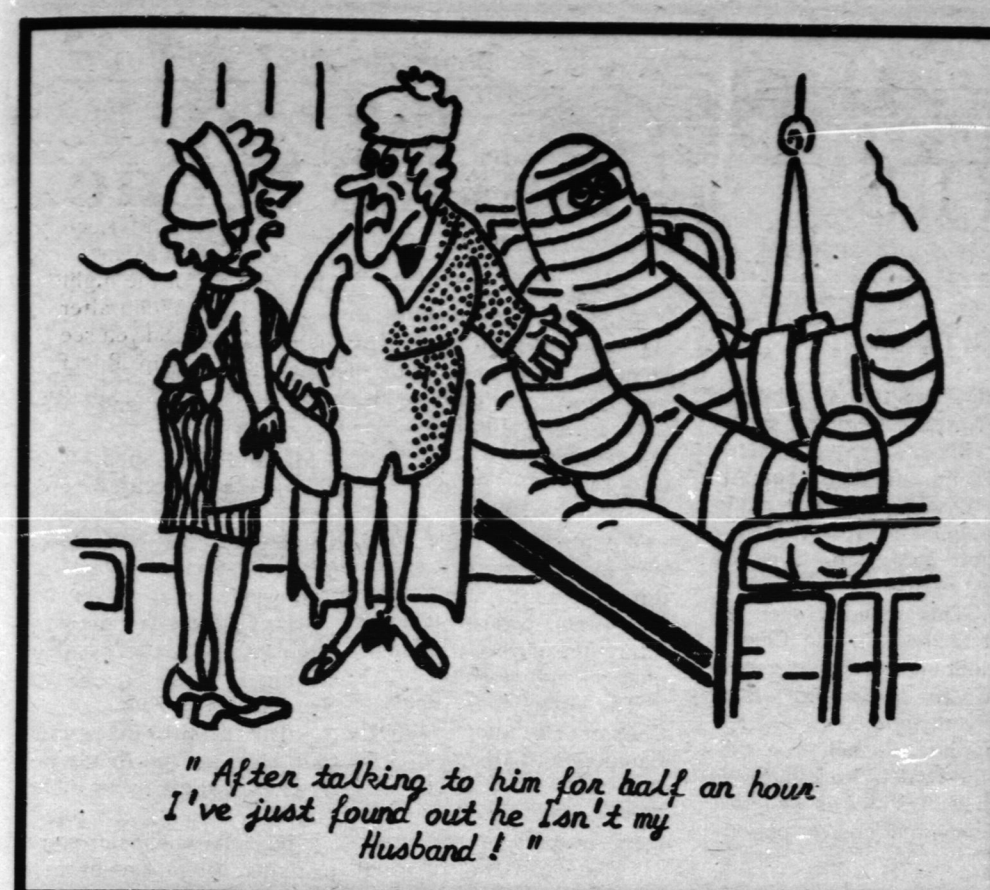

Two recent close calls for Oxford farmers handling liquid manure bring a reminder. Gases from Liquid Manure tanks can be most dangerous. In one case 27 cattle were affected. Twenty-two of them died. The farmer in this case tried to go to

their aid but realized he was being affected and returned to an open door where he collapsed.

Precautions to avoid the serious hazard include lots of ventilation when liquid manure is agitated. Livestock and people should not be allowed in the building involved during agitation or pumping of liquid manure. Protection should be supplied to prevent the dangerous gases from entering buildings from the manure storage area.

O.M.A.F. Agricultural engineers have more detailed instruction for those directly involved. Enquiries are invited.
