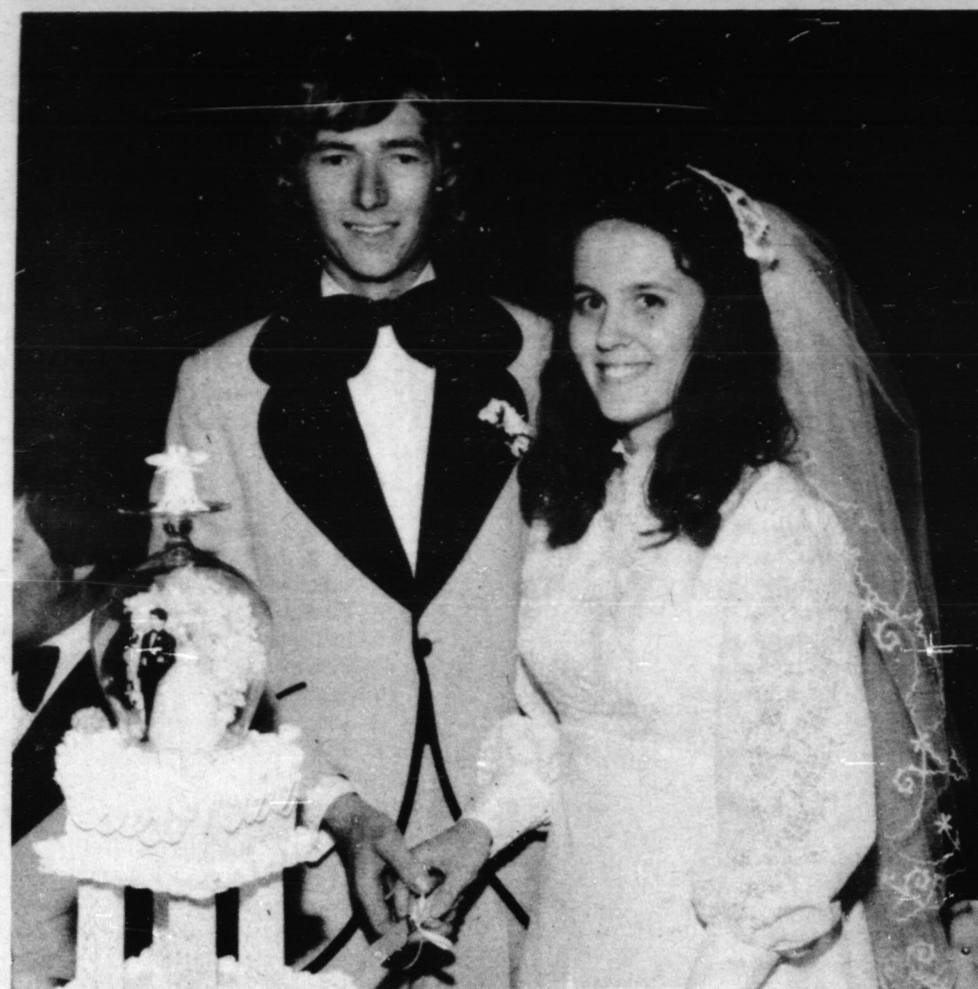

The approaching autumn season signals "Back - to School" time for many area students... adults included. As children pick up their studies on a full - time basis, other folks in the community are beginning to plan their part - time programs.

Mohawk College will be offering ten - credit and/or general interest courses in Hagersville this fall. Classes will include Flower Arranging, Canadiana, Psychology 1, Psychology 2, Review Course for Homemakers, Surveying 1, Yoga (2 Beginners), Yoga (Advanced) and Mohawk Concert Band.

The exciting, challenging art of flower arranging offers new opportunities for home decoration. The course will introduce elements and principles of design; colours as a

design element; mechanics of holding designs and containers. Projects could include the incorporation of candles, style flower arranging; and silica - gel dyeing for preservation of colour and arrangements.

The Candiana course takes a glimpse into Canada's past particularly Upper Canada, with focus on pioneer life and customs. Topics covered will include pioneer lifestyles and customs, antiques, architecture and Canadian artists. The program will comprise lectures, discussions, presentations by guest speakers and field trips.

Psychology 1 and 2 deal with the issues and concepts which constitute the mainstream of contemporary psychology; learning, perception, maturation and devel-

opment, motivation, personality and mental health.

The Review Course of Homemakers will serve as an update of meal planning, buying and cooking efficiently, housecleaning, house management and safety.

The basic theoretical application of surveying will be taught in the Surveying 1 course.

Two local junior hockey leagues have expanded and next week the local Intermediate B loop will be holding a meeting as the hockey season draws near.

The OHA Niagara and District Junior C League will have seven entries this season. Returning to the Junior C loop will be Dunnville, who won the OHA Niagara and District Junior C League, Simcoe, Merriton, Beamsville, Stoney Creek, and Hagersville with Glanbrook, near Mount Hope a new entry in the league.

The league is still uncertain as to who the convenor will be. Frank Doherty, last years convenor, along with Bud Miller, current OHA Junior D convenor and Mike Bollert, manager of the Simcoe Jets, have been seeking the post. Miller and Bollert are expected to get a joint-convenorship.

Stewart has moved over to Waterford of the Junior D league, which has expanded to eight teams. The Southern Counties Junior loop met Tuesday in Waterford and announced that Flamboro has joined the seven other clubs that includes defending champion St. George Lions, Ancaster Shamrocks, Burford Knights, Waterford Tricats, Port Dover Sailors, Delhi Flames and Norwich Merchants.

Although Flamboro missed the meeting this week, all clubs will be present at the next meeting which will take place Wednesday, Sept. 10, in Norwich.

The Intermediate League will meet for the third time next week in Aylmer. Teams will announce at that meeting as to their intentions for the upcoming season. The league will have a new convenor with Eddie O'Donnell stepping down from the post he has held since the league began seven years ago.

We can't take part in radio hot line shows, or put up a sign to support our favourite candidate.

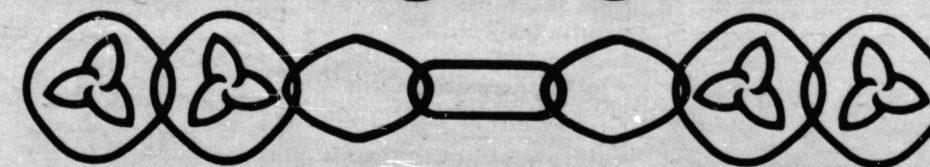
All we ask is our basic civil liberties. The right to take part in the democratic process.
