

There are two basic components in the Eberhardt system—an easily transportable, tractor pto-driven press and 7 ft. 10 in. diameter plastic sack with a maximum length of 82 ft. and a storage capacity of between 75 and 100 tons, depending on the crop to be stored.

Advantages of the system include:

- no capital outlay for horizontal or tower silos
- unlimited sealed storage capacity
- low labor requirement
- stored material easily extracted for feeding
- minimum wastage
- no odor

Chopped material is fed into the 17 rpm press by any conventional forage box or dump wagon although a rear unloading unit is the most efficient.

The plastic sack is drawn over the shaping tunnel of the press. A tubular frame carrying rope netting and attached by steel ropes to tension drums on the Silopress is then set in position.

The sealed end of the sack is placed against the frame. During filling only feed pressure moves the press slowly forward, the rate and therefore the consolidation being controlled by adjustable drum braking on the pay-out of the steel ropes, leaving the filled sack on the ground.
