

On the Farm Front

In case a reminder is necessary, Caledonia Fair is held September 25 to 28. The work of the society directors and of the multitude of exhibitors deserves your support.

Oneida Plowing Match date is Saturday, October 11 and Haldimand Plowing Match will be on Thursday, October 16.

Soil samples to provide fertilizer recommendations for the 1976 crop can be taken now or as soon as time is available. Higher fertilizer prices will make soil testing even more profitable than ever before.

Many enquiries are now being received about the Ontario Young Farmer Credit Program. This program provides for loans at Prime plus one to those 35 years of age or under. Usual loan purposes are for purchase of livestock, equipment, and buildings. Repayment period can extend to 10 years. Other differences with the loan program include loan amounts according to repayment capacity rather than according to net worth.

The Canada Farm Building Service provides standard sets of plans for the usual farm buildings. Plans are provided as prepared by Agriculture Canada through the Extension Branch of the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food. Where additional assistance is required Bruce McBride, agricultural engineer for Haldimand and Wentworth, is available by contacting either the Cayuga or Ancaster offices of the Ministry.

It is quite interesting to observe that most good farmers are concerned about land use. Other land owners it seems are only interested in how many dollars they can make by dividing land into as many parcels as they can get.

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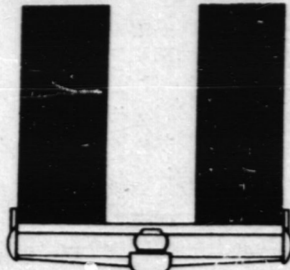
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Nine policemen awarded gold medals

Nine police officers in four provinces have been awarded gold medals for "exceptional devotion to duty" in combatting crimes against banks during the past year.

The officers were guests of the Canadian Bankers' Association (CBA) at the annual conference of the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police (CAC) in Toronto where the medals were presented.



The Canadian Bankers' Law Enforcement Award offered by the CBA consists of a gold medal supported by a grey and maroon ribbon, and a framed citation.

Those honored were: Constable James Agnew, Vancouver Police Department; Constables Brian Tuckey and Robert Ellergott, Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Coquitlam, B.C.; Detective Leonard Daniel and Constable Robert Martin.

The presentations were made jointly by CBA president J. Allan Boyle, executive vice-president and chief general manager, Toronto Dominion Bank, and CACP president Jim Gregory of Victoria.

A police dog, involved in the same incident for which the Winnipeg officers won their medals was also recognized with a special presentation for its role.

The awards are made for "meritorious police action" in combatting crimes against banks, including robbery, fraud, embezzlement and extortion.

Constable Agnew captured an armed robbery suspect following a holdup at a Toronto Dominion Bank branch in Vancouver on March 26, 1975. RCMP constables Tuckey and Ellergott were involved in a running gunfight with bank robbers after a Bank of Montreal branch in Coquitlam was held up a few days later.

Detective Daniel and Constable Martin of Winnipeg were also involved in an exchange of shots while

chasing a suspect after a Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce branch in Winnipeg had been held up in January this year. Constable Martin would undoubtedly have been shot at close range but for the action of his police dog Axel in attacking one of the suspects.

Constable Veronneau was off-duty when a Provincial Bank of Canada branch in Longueuil was held up in February last year. He was approaching the branch as the alarm sounded, followed the suspect, arrested him and recovered the stolen money.

Constable VanBerkel literally grabbed an armed bank robbery suspect after a Toronto Dominion Bank branch was held up in St. Thomas in June last year. Constable Crossley of Toronto, received his award for initiative and fast thinking in his capture of an extortion suspect in November, 1974 after the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce and Toronto Dominion banks in down-

town Toronto had received notes demanding large sums of money and threatening a massive bomb explosion.

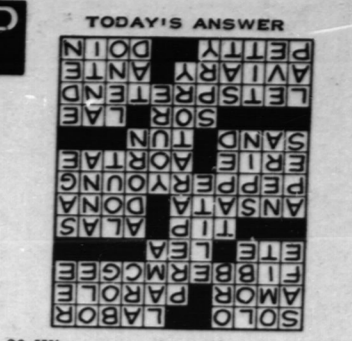
