1976 licence renewal stickers now on sale

Ontario's Transportation and Communications Minister James Snow has announced that the 1976 licence renewal stickers for passenger cars and trailers went on sale December 1, and has urged motorists to purchase their renewal stickers early at any of the 296 licence issuing offices throughout the province.

"The introduction of the licence sticker system has resulted in fewer long lines at licence issuing offices as the deadline approaches," the Minister said.

"We hope motorists will purchase their stickers early this year."

The 1976 validation stickers for passenger cars are blue in color; those for trailers are red. The fees remain the same at \$23 for a

4-cylinder car; \$32 for 6-cylinders; \$40 for an 8-cylinder car; and \$5 for trailers.

Simplified renewal application forms containing an insurance declaration are available again this year at all provincial L.C.B.O. retail outlets, as well as at licence issuing offices.

Failure to affix the sticker by the required date is an offence under The Highway Traffic Act of Ontario.

Owners of motor-assisted bicycles are reminded that licence plates for mopeds and drivers licenses for drivers of such vehicles also became available on December 1st.

Under the new legislation, there is an annual registration fee of \$5 for the operation of a motor-assisted bicycle.

A directory of information is being compiled at the Haldimand-Norfolk Information Centre by Elizabeth Cooper and Tillie Jildere. It is to be updated four times a year and made available to anyone who wants one for a fee.

The centre, operating under a LIP grant of \$9,000 for 1975, is headed by John Spiers. During November, 486 calls were received by the information staff. Calls relating to the mail strike numbered 109, while 34 calls were pertaining to regional government.

Ombudsman to protect rights

At the swearing-in ceremonies for Arthur Maloney, Ontario's first Ombudsman, Premier William Davis said the office was created to maintain an overriding concern and respect for the rights, freedoms and security of the individual.

"Because of the larger complexities now facing each individual in today's world, there is a greater need for reinforcement of our belief in these rights in a proven and practical manner," said the premier.

Mr. Davis said it will be the role of the Ombudsman to investigate recommendations, decisions and actions committed or omitted in the administration of provincial government.

"Ontario has a proud and enviable record of upholding and defending the rights of the individual. The Ontario Human Rights Code, now 15 years old, prescribes in law certain moral principles governing the behaviour of individuals towards each

other and of institutions toward the individual.

"What we seek in the creation of an Ombudsman for all Ontario is still greater accessibility for the individual to the security of freedom under existing law in a democratic society," said Mr. Davis.

The premier said it is "not surprising" that the appointment of Arthur Maloney "has been greeted with wide public accord."

"Mr. Maloney, a native Ontarian, is one of Canada's most distinguished citizens. He is from a family renowned for its contribution to the public life of Canada and Ontario. His father was a Federal Member of Parliament, and his brother and grandfather were both members of this Legislature. Mr. Maloney himself served as a Member of Parliament of Canada from 1957 to 1962.

Above all else, Mr. Maloney has distinguished himself by his outstanding service to the cause of justice in this country, both in its advocacy and its defence," said Mr. Davis.

Christian Farmers Federation of Ontario Elect New Officers

John Janssens, an egg producer from Watford in Lambton County, was elected as President of the Christian Farmers Federation of Ontario for 1976 at the Annual Meeting of the organization in Acton on December 5.

Mr. Janssens has served the organization as its Vice-President for the past three years. He takes over the leadership from Martin Verkuy, a corn grower and hog producer from Hickson in Oxford County.

Mr. Verkuy has led the organization for the past five years but was unable to seek re-election as the Federation's constitution limits its leaders to five years in any one office. During those five years the organization has grown from about 100 members without staff or office to 500 members with two full-time and one part-time employees and an office in Drayton. He will continue to serve on the Federation's Executive Board as Past-President of the organization.

Tom Lise, a hog producer from Moorefield in Wellington County, will now leave the Federation's Executive after serving as President in 1970 and as Past-President for the five years since.

Herman Deen, a chicken producer and dairyman from Drayton in Wellington County will be a new member of the Federation's 1976 Executive Board. He was elected as Vice-President from a slate of nominees that included: Sid Ryzebol a Dufferin County hog and beef producer, Sid Sikkema a Wellington County dairyman and hog producer, George Zekveld an Ontario County hog producer, and Bob Zylstra a Middlesex County hog producer.

Just under 100 attended the day long event. Sister Thomas More, "The Farmers' Nun", from Manitowoc, Wisconsin gave the keynote address on the theme: The Christian Faith and Agriculture.

1976 Federation Membership Fees were raised from \$35 to a basic fee of \$50 plus a request for an additional

membership fee of \$20. In 1975 the members were asked for \$15 above the basic fee. The increased fees were

necessary since the Federation's budget was increased by 40 percent in order to hire additional staff as well as

keep up with inflation. Elbert van Donkersgoed, the Federation's Executive Director, also addressed the

meeting with a talk on: Faith, Ideology, and Agriculture - There is a Connection.
