



## Lakewood camp serves crippled children with help of Easter seals

Although some \$250,000 is still needed to reach this year's Easter Seal objective of \$2,000,000 the Ontario Society for Crippled Children hopes that companies and individuals who normally contribute outside the official campaign period will close this gap by the year end.

Whipper Watson firmly believes that all youngsters derive some benefit from a camping experience, and from the look on the faces of

his two young friends listening to his tales of camp life, it is obvious that the crippled child is no exception to this attraction.

The Ontario Society has long understood and recognized this need and its five camps today offer the largest summer camping program of its kind in the world.

Thanks to Easter Seals, the society will again open its gates to young campers. By the end of summer, more than 1000 of Ontario's handicapped youngsters will have enjoyed a two-week vacation in a relaxed atmosphere.

away from the demands or confines of treatment centre or hospital routines.

Activities are designed to encourage the active rehabilitation of each camper both physically and emotionally in stimulating surroundings and special emphasis is placed on individual participation in these activities.

Lakewood Camp with its 18 permanent buildings on a 50 acre lakefront setting has been serving crippled children from this area since 1954. The camp is located on Long Beach Road west of Port Colborne.

## Industrial park loans available

An industrial parks program that will provide loans to municipalities intending to acquire or service industrial lands was announced today by Claude Bennett, Ontario Minister of Industry and Tourism.

Mr. Bennett said the Government of Ontario has recognized the need to diversify industrial development more broadly throughout the province to relieve the pressure of growth on the metropolitan areas and to stimulate the development of job opportunities in communities that have experienced a slower rate of economic growth.

Much has been accomplished by improved transportation and communication facilities and the decentralization of the operations of various Ministries. However there is a need for more to be done to attract private sector investments. This was one of the most frequent subjects discussed with municipal officials during my summer tours of Ontario.

It became evident to me that many communities with significant industrial development potential often lack the essential ingredient to accommodate new industrial operations and the requirements of progressive local entrepreneurs, namely, serviced land at competitive prices.

I found that most communities were aware of this need and many had developed comprehensive plans. However, there are frequently inadequate financial resources to acquire industrial land and more importantly to provide the necessary services.

Consequently, I instructed the staff of my Ministry to study the matter and develop a program to meet the apparent needs in co-operation with municipal officials.

The intention of the government to support a program of this type was reflected in the Ontario Budget presented by the treasurer of April 7, 1975. At that time, it was announced that funds were being allocated to the new Ontario Land Corporation for the development of industrial parks.

Unfortunately, subsequent budgetary actions of the Federal Government forced Ontario to reduce its spending plans but this program was modified in degree only and plans for its implementation are proceeding.

The essential feature of the program is that it will support municipal initiatives in the acquisition and servicing of industrial land by providing deferred repayable loans with a degree of interest forgiveness.

The eligibility of a community for participation will be established by a rigid set of criteria and will include assurance that it can provide the various services required by an industrial enterprise and that the plan conforms to development policies and priorities of all government ministries.

The program recognizes the valuable role the private sector plays in development and will provide assistance to private developers for the servicing of land which they own, consistent with the plans of the municipalities involved.

The Ontario Development Corporation and its affiliated Northern and Eastern Ontario Development Corporations will administer the financial aspects of the program.

As will be realized such a program involving the use of both provincial and municipal funds must take into account many legislative factors. On July 11, 1975, an enabling amendment to the Development Corporations Act was given first reading in the legislature. The fact that this legislation did not receive Royal Assent prior to the recess of the house will in no way interfere with the continuing development of the program which I plan to have in operation this fall.

Municipalities wishing to participate in the Industrial Parks Program are invited to discuss their industrial development plans with the ministry's field officers so that the necessary preparatory details can be completed ready for implementation, when the enabling legislation has been passed and received Royal Assent.

I want to reassure municipalities that no time is being lost because the legislation was not passed in the spring session. There is a great deal of work to be done by municipalities and the ministry before the plan can be implemented.

## Lelliott cops twin features

"Stormin' Norman Lelliott" of London, Ont. blew into Cayuga International Speedway on Friday night, August 15th, and blew off the opposition in coping both ends of the twin 30-lap features. The two victories guaranteed the Carling-O'Keefe representative starting berths in both the Watkins Glen 250 in Sept. and the Race of Champions at Trenton, New Jersey in mid-October.

Lelliott and points leader, Junior Hanley, staged a frantic battle for the lead in the first feature event as they battled bumper to bumper for 10 laps on the 5/8th mile oval. Taking the low groove approaching slower cars, Lelliott edged past Hanley to gain the lead on lap 25 and held on for the victory. Jerry Makara, presently second in the Radio Shack sponsored point standings, severely damaged his Camaro in a

qualifying heat but started both features in Brian Setterington's STP Camaro. In his first effort he finished fourth to maintain his position in the standings.

Lelliott's victory in the second feature came as no real surprise as he gained an early lead from his twelfth starting spot and compel to an easy win. Junior Hanley staved off strong bids by Windsor's Jack Monaghan and Makara to again finish

second in the second half of the feature event. Monaghan finished third and Makara fourth.

The caution flag proved costly for Embro's Doug Garner in the 15-lap Compact feature. After building up a half lap lead over division leader, Randy Slack, the Gremlin driver saw his margin disappear when Ross McKeen of Sarnia looped his Vega in turn two bringing out the race's only caution flag

and permitting Slack to move into striking distance. Following the restart, Slack and Garner ran bumper to bumper with Slack squeezing into the lead on the final turn of the last lap. Joe Mihalec of Buffalo finished a distant third.

Larry Benjamin, after qualifying through the consolation event, romped to an easy win in the Houghton Rustproofing Mini Stock Division feature. The win was the Volkswagen competitor's 5th feature victory of the season. Randy Slack of Caledonia and Bill Leleve of Limehouse, Ont. finished

third and fourth respectively. Point leaders Andy Wirth and Larry Anthony, presently second in the point standings, were unable to break out of the tightly grouped field and were 4th and 5th place finishers.

Next week's features will decide the points champions in all three divisions as Cayuga's regular season draws to a close. Also scheduled for a special intermission attraction are the Export "A. Hell Drivers, featuring top international movie stunt men and world professional dare devils. Races start at 8:30 p.m.

### The First School Day

1. In both elementary and secondary schools, Monday, September 8, will be a full school day. Buses will operate on their regular daily schedule.

2. On arrival, students will proceed as directed by P.A. and posted notices in the school.

3. For secondary school students a sum of approximately \$15 will suffice in most instances for uniforms, equipment, etc. There is no charge for textbooks below the Grad 13 level.

Register at the school between 10:30 a.m. and 12:30 on Tuesday September 2.

#### Secondary School:

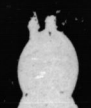
