Viewing weekend

For the fourth consecutive year the Ministry of Natural Resources will be sponsoring a special weekend on March 22-23 for the general public to visit the Long Point area to view waterfowl on their northern migration.

A checkpoint will be set up on Highway No. 59 at the base of the Long Point Causeway to direct and aid visitors. Here visitors will receive general information on waterfowl migration as well as direction to specially located viewing points staffed by qualified naturalists and equipped with viewing scopes and waterfowl identification aids.

The weekend is a joint effort by the Ministry of Natural Resources, The Canadian Wildlife Service, The Federation of Ontario Naturalists, The Norfolk Field Naturalists, The Long Point Bird Observatory

and the Long Point Region Conservation Authority.

It is intended as an introduction to the phenomenon of waterfowl migration for amateur bird watchers as well as the general public and all interested people are encouraged to come out and participate in the viewing of ducks, geese and swans on their northward track.
