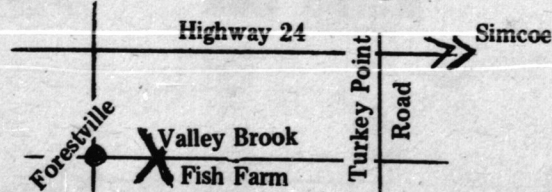

Pork congress

Last year in its first year of operation, the Ontario Pork Congress reported an attendance of over 6,000 from all areas of the pork industry. This year, with only minor modifications, the Ontario Pork Congress, to be held June 17, 18 and 19 at the Stratford Coliseum, anticipates an attendance of over 10,000.

An expansion of an excellent educational program and several improvements in services available throughout the three days have been planned for the 1975 event. More than 75 exhibitors will

be displaying products and services in over 14,000 square feet of exhibit space.

On June 17, the Show and Sale of Purebred Gilts and Boars will be held. Station-tested boars and home-tested purebred stock will be valued and sold. In the evening, a Junior Barrow Show will take place.

The Feeder Pig Show and Sale, June 18, is the only show of its kind in Canada, and feeder pigs weighing from 40 to 60 pounds will be judged and sold.

For Market Pig Day, June 19, nominated barrows that have been weighed on test at the end of April will be weighed off test and judged and sold.

An educational program will be held each morning from 10 a.m. to 12 noon. Congress organizers have planned some excellent topics and speakers for these sessions, including Dr. W.P. Switzer, of Iowa State University, one of the world's leading authorities on rhinitis and pneumonia.



Organ donor coupon now on licence

Minister of Transportation and Communications John R. Rhodes today announced in the legislature Ontario is the first province in Canada to include an organ donor section on drivers' licences.

Mr. Rhodes said the licence form has been redesigned to include a legal declaration which allows drivers to donate or allow transplantation of human organs after death.

"A driver who has reached the age of majority (18 in Ontario) has only to indicate his wishes, then sign the declaration," Mr. Rhodes explained.

The Minister went on to point out drivers are not obligated to sign the organ donor section of the licence. If a driver doesn't want to become a donor, he can detach and destroy this section of his licence.

"We sincerely hope that those among the more than four million licensed Ontario drivers who are eligible will consider taking advantage of this

declaration," Mr. Rhodes said.

Outside the Legislature, Mr. Rhodes presented the first of the new licences to Dr. George A. deVeber, chairman of the Organ Donor Program Committee, the Kidney Foundation of Canada, and director of the Dialysis and Kidney Transplantation Program at Toronto Western Hospital.

He praised Dr. DeVeber who played a vital role in bringing the idea of a donor declaration to his attention.

The new licences with the attached donor declaration will begin to be distributed this week as part of the normal renewal process based on drivers' birth dates at a rate of about 60,000 licences a week.
