Fanshawe opens Dover campus

Mrs. James Allen, wife of Dr. James A. Allen, President of Fanshawe College, cut the ribbon to officially open the Port Dover campus of Fanshawe College last Thursday.

To complete the opening ceremonies Nanticoke Mayor John Pow, and Victor Spencer Chairman of the Fanshawe College Board of Governors jointly welded a plaque together in the welding shops of the college. The plaque was made by students Ian Smith who did the script, and Robert Sexton who did the cutting.

Other participants in the opening ceremonies for the

adult education centre were Dr. James A. Allen, President of Fanshawe College, Robert Williamson, Manager of the Canada Manpower Centre in Simcoe, and members of the Board of Governors, Fanshawe's area advisory committees, and the Norfolk Needs Study Committee.

In addressing the guests at the opening ceremony, Fanshawe President, Dr. James Colvin said that the Port Dover centre is "a response to developments in the area, and to the need for people trained in welding construction trades, and business."

Victor Spencer, Chairman of the Fanshawe Board of Governors, announced it was his first time on the campus and was "impressed with what had been done with a small amount of money."

Renovations had been done at a cost of \$3.97 per square foot.

"Because we have gotten such good mileage out of money used here, we will look more optimistically at further expansion here," he said.

John Pow, Mayor of Nanticoke brought greetings from the city, and congratulated Fanshawe for making the right move at the right time.

Robert Williamson represented Canada Manpower at the opening.

"We have been working to try to assess the needs of the area now and in future," he said. "Together with Fanshawe we have put together skill that are needed now and will be needed in the future."

According to Mr. Williamson there will be more growth for the Port Dover campus as well.

"What you see here in facilities will be meagre compared to what you will see here in two years time," he said.

The new campus is located on St. George St. in Port Dover in the renovated former Norfolk Knitters Building. Facilities include three classrooms, a 12 bay welding shop, and more than 2,000 square feet of workshop space for carpentry and travel trades.

The Managed Forest Tax Reduction program will be co-ordinated by two Ontario ministries. The Ministry of Natural Resources will set the forest management criteria and field audit the program. The Ministry of Treasury, Economics and Inter-governmental Affairs will administer the tax rebates, as it does the Farm Tax Reduction program in co-operation with the Ministry of Agriculture and Food.
