

WIFE, DAUGHTER HURT

Pals Crash, One Killed Near Jarvis

JARVIS (Special) — William James Person, 37, of R.R. 1, Jarvis, was killed and his wife and daughter seriously injured a mile west of here Friday when his car was sideswiped by a truck driven by a friend.

The truck, owned by J. B. Jackson Ltd. of Simcoe, was driven by Frank Elmer Lloyd, 39, of Martin Ave., Simcoe.

Person was Lloyd's best man when he was married in September, 1948.

Mrs. Person and two-year-old Michele were taken to Norfolk

General Hospital and later transferred to Hamilton General Hospital by Green's Ambulance.

Mrs. Person was reported in poor condition with chest injuries. Michele is listed as critical with head injuries.

Person, a Haldimand farmer, was westbound and the truck was eastbound when the truck skidded into the westbound lane, police said.

There was some \$3,000 total damage done to the truck and car.

Const. Walter Winger of Simcoe OPP investigated the crash, reported at 10:30 a.m.

WILLIAM PERSON FATALLY HURT IN CAR-TRUCK CRASH

William Person of R.R. 1, Jarvis, was instantly killed when the car he was driving crashed almost head-on with a heavy truck about one mile west of Jarvis on No. 3 Highway Friday morning (March 4th). His wife and two-year old daughter were also seriously injured. Mrs. Person was taken to the Norfolk General Hospital in Simcoe and the little girl was rushed to Hamilton Hospital.

The driver of the truck was not injured seriously. The truck was owned by J. B. Jackson Ltd., Simcoe, Ontario.

Mr. and Mrs. Person were travelling west enroute to the home of Mrs. Person's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Stone in Simcoe. The truck was east bound and appeared to veer in front of the Person car on the Highway turn.

O.P.P. Constable Walter Winger of the Simcoe detachment investigated the accident and Dr. Keith McIntosh, Coroner, was also at the scene.

Funeral arrangements were indefinite at time of going to press.

VILLAGE AREA WILL INCREASE FORTY PER CENT WITH ANNEXATION

CAPITAL LOAN APPROVED

The Village Council has received notification from the Ontario Municipal Board approving 248 acres of the 274 acres made in the original request for annexed lands from the Township of Walpole. This will increase the area of the Village by forty per cent. The Board failed to approve 26 acres of land owned by Harold Slater, who objected to the annexation at the hearing last week. This land lies at the south east corner of the Village.

It was also learned this week that the application of the Village for a loan of \$200,000 from the Municipal Development and Loan Fund had been approved by Ottawa.

This loan bears 5% interest, and for projects completed by March 31 the municipality will benefit by a forgiveness of 25 per cent of the amount.

The Village of Hagersville also had a loan approved in the amount of \$43,250 for the purpose of building a new municipal building.

The Chairman, Mr. Miller, opened the meeting and Mrs. Nichol read the minutes of the last meeting. It was moved by Mr. Nie and seconded by Mrs. Lamb that the minutes be adopted as read.

It was announced that Mr. Chas. Pearce will be publicly chairman. One of the most important features for each member of the committee to consider when they are discussing Centennial plans with friends would be to inform them that the events planned will be continuous throughout the year, not just one or two events.
