Department found no hope of saving the dwelling. The family escaped, other than the two daughters, with only their bed clothing.

The family, apparently, had all retired shortly before the fire broke out. Mrs. Helder awoke at 12.45 A.M. and smelled smoke. She awakened her husband. He found flames emitting from an air vent from the basement. Within moments the whole house was aflame. Mr. Helder took every means he could to arouse his children, but he could not gain entrance to the room where his
