

## HALDIMAND-NORFOLK MEMBER RETIRES FROM CABINET DUTIES



James Noble Allan, member for Haldimand-Norfolk in the Ontario Legislature and for the past twelve years a Cabinet Minister has retired from the Robarts Cabinet.

Mr. Allan is currently Chair man of the Niagara Parks Commission and is a member of the Niagara Bridge Commission. In his letter of resignation to Premier Robarts he said he was finding his job as Chairman of the Niagara Parks Commission so demanding that he had to give up the Cabinet post.

Mr Allan, regarded as a trouble shooter for both the Frost and Robarts administrations. was regarded as the most aggressive and well liked Cabinet Minister in his time.

First elected as member for Haldimand-Norfolk in 1951, Mr. Allan was appointed Minister of Highways in 1955 when he succeeded Geoge Doucett He succeeded in instituting new JAMES N. ALLAN, M.P.P. methods of tendering that cleaned up problems that had brought on an earlier Highway Scandal involving padded con-

He was also the first Minister of Transport and served for a time as acting Minister of Public Works In 1958 he was appointed Provincial Treasurer, a post he held until 1966 when he was replaced by the present Treasurer, Charles McNaughton Since that time he served as Minister without Portfolio. Mr. Allan's first budget as Treasurer in 1959 was for \$886 Million. His eighth in 1966 was for \$1.8 Billion.
