HALDIMAND-NORFOLK MEMBER RETIRES FROM CABINET DUTIES

James Noble Allan, member for Haldimand-Norfolk in the Ontario Legislature and for the past twelve years a Cabinet Minister, has retired from the Robarts Cabinet.

Mr. Allan is currently Chairman of the Niagara Parks Commission and is a member of the Niagara Bridge Commission. In his letter of resignation to Premier Robarts he said he was finding his job as Chairman of the Niagara Parks Commission so demanding that he had to give up the Cabinet post.

Mr. Allan, regarded as a trouble shooter for both the Frost and Robarts administrations was regarded as the most aggressive and well liked Cabinet Minister in his time.

First elected as member for Haldimand-Norfolk in 1951, Mr. Allan was appointed Minister of Highways in 1955 when he succeeded George Doucett. He succeeded in instituting new methods of tendering that cleaned up problems that had brought on an earlier Highway Scandal involving padded contracts.

He was also the first Minister of Transport and served for a time as acting Minister of Public Works. In 1958 he was appointed Provincial Treasurer, a post he held until 1966 when he was replaced by the present Treasurer, Charles McNaughton. Since that time he served as Minister without Portfolio. Mr. Allan's first budget as Treasurer in 1959 was for \$886 Million. His eighth in 1966 was for \$1.8 Billion.

"JIM" ALLAN UNANIMOUS CHOICE OF HALDIMAND-NORFOLK P.C.'S

James N. Allan was acclaimed as Progressive Conservative Candidate for the forthcoming Provincial Election on Tuesday, October 17th, by some 450 people who attended the nomination convention held in Jarvis last Thursday evening.

Mr. Allan and his wife were piped to the platform by Al Peters of Dunnville and to a standing ovation by the capacity crowd.

Mr. Allan's nomination was moved by Bill Knowles, North Walsingham, Norfolk and seconded by Frank Ramsey, Dunnville, Haldimand.

Mr. Knowles said in part: "His ability to succeed in politics does not have to be guessed at—his capabilities in this area are well known; they are on the records of government, they are accomplished facts, achievements fashioned during his 16 years at Queen's Park."

"All his time as well as his considerable ability and wide experience will be devoted to the single task of representing the people of this riding. He will have access to offices of the Prime Minister and Ministers of the Cabinet where his judgements and proposals for action are respected."

"The one over-riding characteristic of Jim Allan as a P.C. Candidate is his unique ability to meet people, win their confidence and make them his friends regardless of their political persuasion."

Meeting and talking with people are meat and drink to Jim. This explains his jaunty air and youthful outlook as well as the reason he can maintain such a blistering schedule of meetings and appointments.

The meeting was co-chaired by Lyle Furry and Robert Hamilton, Q. C. presidents of Haldimand and Norfolk P. C. Associations.

Mr. Allan in accepting the nomination said that his greatest thrill after 16 years in the Provincial House was the fact that the large number present insisted that he continue to represent them.

He said, "It hasn't been a sacrifice—I've enjoyed it. I have many letters of thanks from individuals I have been able to assist with their problems which I shall always treasure."

"I am proud of the record of the Robarts government. John Robarts is a great Canadian interested in Canada as well as his province. He has endeavoured to provide us with a good way of life keeping in mind that we can afford it."

He referred to the great growth and development of the riding and as an example cited that we now have Long Point Park, Turkey Point Park, Selkirk Park, Rock Point Park and a new one, Dunn Park, to be built next year.

He said, "I will do my best during the campaign and after the campaign."

Attorney General Arthur Wishart Q.C. was guest speaker.

He was high in his praise of Mr. Allan and said, "His judgement is always sage and sound; his advice is invaluable—you have made a wise choice."

Mr. Wishart stated that the government had announced that it was assuming the full cost for the administration of justice. This would mean that the capital cost and maintenance of court houses, registry offices, etc. would be borne by the government. In addition the government will assume the responsibilities for the administration of justice such as engaging and paying staff etc.

The speaker pointed out that this action by the government will lift considerable from the tax burden and make for greater uniformity in the various counties.

Mr. Wishart said that the government are taking over smaller police forces in order to make for greater efficiency. He stressed that this was on a strictly voluntary basis and that already some 40 of the 46 municipalities with a one man police force have asked to have it taken over by the government which will use the provincial police.

The government are now moving to make the same offer to municipalities with 2 and 3 men forces and will likely do the same with 4 and possibly 5 men forces.

He pointed out that these municipalities must continue to enforce their own by-laws and that where possible all men affected would be absorbed in the Provincial Police Force.

Entertainment during the evening was provided by the Jarvis Christian Brass Band "Crescendo" and the Caledonia Choralists under the direction of Mr. George Shippey.

The meeting closed with "God Save the Queen".
